





FROM POSTURE TO ProDOS

Have you noticed yourself rubbing your eyes, neck, or back after several hours in front of your computer? If you have—and I dare say that most of us have suffered some form of computer-related fatigue—you should definitely consider rearranging and perhaps even investing further in the furniture you use with your computer.

the LaserWriter to produce stunning typeset-quality printouts. The tutorial will also show you how to program the LaserWriter for special effects, such as rotation of text and graphics.

We are also continuing our ProDOS tutorial with the second part of the series.

By the time you get this issue, with summer vacation looming on the horizon, you might be thinking about sending your children to a computer camp. Just as with any other camp, you must pick a computer camp carefully in order to provide the experience you have in mind for your children. Vanessa Schnatmeier's article "Choosing the Right Computer Camp" gives you step-by-step guidance to help you evaluate the best computer camp for your kids.

SPEEDEMON UPDATE

Dear A +,

I wish to call your attention to the addendum to the excerpt from Charles Rubin's *The Endless Apple* entitled "The Latest Enhancements" (A+, March 1985, pages 154-155).

Although we are grateful for being mentioned as a competitor in the "speed-up" war of 65C02 processor boards, we have an update we would like you and your readers to know about. Mr. Rubin states that "if you're worried about power consumption, however, you should also know that the SpeeDemon draws twice the wattage of the Accelerator cards." This assertion is no longer true and hasn't been for some time. The SpeeDemon did draw twice the wattage of other cards at 1 amp, but it now draws 650 milliamps. I felt it important to update this issue, since I've had concerned customers calling about their power consumption.

DISK DRIVES REVISITED

Dear A +.

Wow, was I disappointed in the article entitled "First Aid for Disk Drives" (A+, March 1985, pages 169-172). I was hoping that it would help to dispel some of the mystery in which computer-service personnel seem to have shrouded the Apple Disk II. About all the article covered was that you should check for loose cable connectors and how to pry up the multipin IC chips safely.

One possibly valuable clue, however, was that the 9334 (or 74LS259—which is apparently interchangeable with the 9334—the motor-enable and stepper-control circuits), the 74LS05 (the inverter bank) and PROM P6 (or P6A—boot-load routine) were chips on the controller card that were most likely to

fail. Unfortunately, you didn't include any symptoms that would identify these failed chips (for instance, what does the "inverter bank" do?).

One nice thing that Apple did when it designed the Apple II computer was to put letters along the side of the board and numbers along the top of the board, thereby helping to identify the locations of chips. For example, the N9334N, mentioned previously, is located at C2. This tip might help your readers locate the chips referenced in the article.

Also, I noted Gayler's excellent book The Apple II Circuit Description referenced at the end of the article. I'm sorry to report that this book does not cover any peripheral devices such as the Disk II. For those readers wanting circuit schematics, Apple did include the Disk II Interface Card on page 145 and the Disk II Analog Board on page 146 of The DOS Manual, which comes with the Apple II system. So far, I've failed to locate a schematic for the small board at the back of the Disk II that includes the multiturn pot used commonly for speed adjustment. I'm hoping that your next disk-drive-repair article (April 1985) will mention that adjustment, as well as the zero-track adjustment. [Editor's Note: It did. See A+ April 1985, pages 159-167.]

Regarding the software referenced at the end of the article, I've tried Verbatim's Datalife Disk Drive Analyzer on some of my drives (from five different manufacturers), which occasionally seem to be misbehaving, and always it says the drives are "OK." The go/no-go analysis is only marginally helpful. From reading its literature, it appears that the RID disk from Dymek may be more helpful, but so far, I haven't risked the \$35 on it.

One encouraging comment is that the photographic illustrations in your article were great—clear and legible.

'UNDOCUMENTED'

Dear A+,

In the February 1985 issue of A+ (page 132), a MacTip from Paul Papanek Jr. dealt with MacTerminal's "undocumented features." In all fairness, I should point out that these "undocumented features" are merely the standard ASCII editing commands. To add to his list, #-S means send.

Papanek also mentioned that the cursor-changes to another shape when you press the Option key. He noted that it did not do anything when he was online. The explanation is that that cursor is the cursor emulation of the DEC VT-100 terminal. Although the Option key will change the cursor in the TTY mode of MacTerminal, it is functional only when MacTerminal is emulating a VT-100.

If you try to use the Option-key cursor in the TTV mode, you will get interference on the communications line. The cursor allows for text editing. When you hold down the Option key, just position the new-shaped cursor where you want to edit and click the mouse button. This action causes the old underline-type cursor to scurry to the point where you clicked the mouse. Furthermore, in VT-100 emulation, the Enter key acts as the Break key. You use # 6 as the Home key, and #[is Escape.


I also might comment that the Hint Book is not a solution book. It provides an approach that will work to solve each level rather than an absolute solution.

PCjr BITES THE DUST

IBM surprised the industry last March when it suddenly dropped the PCjr from its product lineup. Industry speculation is that IBM made the decision last year and heavily discounted the PCjr last Christmas in order to clear out existing inventory. Now buyers of the PCjr are wondering if they really got a bargain at all.

I always felt that IBM was the wrong company from which to buy a home computer. IBM is set up to support business users, not home users. With the demise of PCjr, the Apple II remains as the only longterm survivor in the home marketplace. The PCir's lack of success also goes to show that people didn't buy PCjr's for home because they had a PC at work; instead, they bought Apple IIs for home because their kids used them at school.

HYBRID PROGRAMS

Apple is currently developing a hybrid programming environment for the 512K Mac that supports Pascal, C, and assembly language. This hybrid will make these

different languages compatible at the object-file and link-format levels, permitting programmers to mix and match code segments from the three languages.


The as-yet-unannounced product will offer a full set of tools such as editors, debuggers, and UNIX-like utilities and is tentatively scheduled for release this fall. Innovative and flexible programming environments such as this should help spur the development of sophisticated new Macintosh software.

APPLE RIPE FOR PLUCKING?

Is Apple Computer, Inc., ripe for a corporate takeover? That's what several stock is undervalued.

Who might be interested in Apple? Well, two names that have come up in recent speculation are AT&T and GE. AT&T has reportedly expressed a keen interest in Apple, and the alliance could be excellent for both companies. AT&T's sales were more than \$53 billion in 1984, compared to IBM's \$45.9 billion and Apple's comparatively tiny \$1.8 billion. The other potential suitor is General Electric, with 1984 sales of \$27.9 billion. GE already has close ties to Apple, in that it sells Apples to its corporate clients and underwrites the Apple credit card.

One of the major obstacles to a buy out is that Steve Jobs controls a huge

HP TARGETS APPLE MARKET

A recent market-research study conducted by SRI International in Menlo Park, California, predicts that Hewlett-Packard will increase its share of the printer market sixfold in the next six months, giving HP an estimated 27% market share. In order to broaden the apple of its product line,



HP plans to introduce new methods of using its price-competitive Thinkjet and Laserjet printers with the Macintosh. We're looking into how these printers can be used with the Apple II series. We'll keep you posted on these developments.

LOTUS SINGS THE BLUES

When Lotus announced Jazz last fall, the company promised the program would be ready by March of this year. When the March deadline arrived, Lotus announced that the program



would not be ready until late May. That news alone sent Apple stock into a nosedive.

Well, by the time this magazine is in print, we should know whether or not Lotus has made good on its May delivery date. We're all hoping that the product will be on dealers' shelves soon, since many business customers are reserving judgment about the Mac until Jazz is out. This wait-and-see attitude has hurt sales of the Mac already and has been fatal to other products in the past.


DEVELOPERS' NETWORK

When it comes to the Macintosh, Microsoft really does mean business. Microsoft's first integrated-software program is Excel, a superlative spreadsheet/graphics/database program for the Macintosh that packs a lot more wallop for number crunching than do either Lotus 1-2-3 or Jazz.

Based on what I've seen, Excel offers the most powerful electronic worksheet of any personal-computer software. It can solve advanced programs such as those involving multiple variables and multiple interactive worksheets. Each worksheet can have a matrix of up to 256 columns by 16,384 rows and includes an on-sheet database with complete querying and sorting capabilities.

There's more. The

graphics features of Excel offer everything that Microsoft Chart has, and then some. Excel also allows you to create powerful macros for automating procedures and creating custom mathematical functions, and it offers two-way file transfers with Multiplan, Chart, Lotus 1-2-3, and SYLK files.

The Mac won't make it into offices unless it can offer performance that is not available on the IBM PC series. Excel looks like the best software for number processing available for any personal computer. This type of high-powered software for the Mac should help make businesspeople more aware of the significant role the Macintosh can play in the office.




PRECIOUS MACINTOSH MEMORIES

Every 128K Macintosh has the potential to grow up into a full-fledged 512K machine. You may, by now, have seen a slew of ads from companies that offer to upgrade your 128K Mac to Fat Mac status for far less than the official Apple price. Are the upgrades any good? What do these folks do when they poke around in the entrails of what may be your favorite computer?

The basic difference between a 128K (Thin) Mac and its 512K (Fat) brother is the type of memory chip they use. A Thin Mac uses 16 chips that each store 65,536 individual bits (64K × 1 chips). The Fat Mac also uses 16 chips, but each of these can store 262,144 bits (256K). Unfortunately, although the chips are quite similar, you can't just unplug the 64K chips and substitute the 256K versions.

Aside from the cruel fact that the 64K chips are soldered directly to the circuit board, you face one other major obstacle in upgrading to more memory: It takes a more precise address to specify one of 256K memory locations than it does to pick from among 64K possibilities. Upgrading your Mac, therefore, means both substituting memory chips and bringing in the additional address information. The theory is going to take a bit of arithmetic to explain, but bear with me—everything is below 20 or an even power of 2, and you don't have to catch all the details to make sense of the general pattern.

In the Thin Mac, 16 bits are necessary to specify an address. If you happen to have memorized your powers of 2, you might have recognized that 16 bits gives you 2¹⁶ (65,536) possibilities, which we call 64K (a binary K, or thousand, is 1024). Using 16 address bits, we can specify any of the 64K data bits



in a $64K \times 1$ RAM chip.

The 68000 microprocessor chip in the Macintosh uses a 16-bit data path, meaning that in each read or write operation it can transfer 16 bits or 2 bytes. So, with 64K possible addresses and up to 2 bytes transferred at each address,

the Thin Mac allows you to work with 128K of RAM.

If you looked at the circuit board inside a Thin Mac, you'd see 16 of the 64K chips arranged in a neat four-by-four rectangle (the memory chips are oblong, so you don't quite get a square). The chips are standard dynamic-memory chips, with 16 pins on each.

Each chip requires one line for pow-

er and one for ground. One line tells the chip whether to accept data to store away or whether to read data back out. Data comes in on one line and leaves on another. So far, that's 5 lines, with 16 pins available in all. We did say that we needed 16 lines just to specify the address of which of the 64K memory cells we wanted the chip to read from or write to, though. Obviously, we have a problem.

Getting 16 address lines on 13 pins is a standard challenge in computer design, with a set of standard solutions. The solution used in the Macintosh is called *multiplexing*. The 16-bit set of address information goes out as two waves of 8 bits each, instead of as a single 16-bit value. Thus only 8 pins are necessary for the 16 address lines, with 2 more pins telling the chip when each wave of 8 address bits is available.

The 68000 itself doesn't use this two-wave multiplexed address, because it has enough pins on its 64-pin package

for a full 24 bits of address. To get the addresses from the full-width (or 16-bit) form the 68000 uses to the two-part (or multiplexed) form the memory chips use, the Mac employs a standard interface chip called a multiplexer. In fact, a standard Thin Mac has four multiplexer chips, each of which handles 4 of the 16 address bits.

One to Grow On

Going back to the memory chips, 16 original pins, minus our first 5 power and control lines, minus 8 more for multiplexed address, minus 2 for multiplex control is 1—we even have a pin left over! In the 64K RAM chips in the Thin Mac, this pin is left unconnected.

If we could connect that unused pin, it would actually count four times over, almost like hitting a four-times-your-coupons day at the supermarket. Hooking up the pin itself would count twice in address bits because it gets used once in each of the two waves of addresses. Instead of two 8-bit address segments, for a total of 16, we'd have two 9-bit segments totaling 18 bits.

Compared to 16 bits, 18 bits can address four times as much memory, because there are four possible combinations of the extra two bits (00, 01, 10, and 11). Looking at it another way, 18 address lines gives us 2¹⁸, or 256K, possibilities, compared to the 2¹⁶, or 64K, possibilities available with 16 address bits.

Luckily for us, when Apple's engineers laid out the Thin Mac circuit board, they were nice enough to connect all the memory pin 1s together and to bring the extra two address lines from the 68000 to a convenient spot on the board.

To upgrade to a Fat Mac, what we have to do is change the memory chips, connect up the wires, and supply an extra multiplexer chip. On the original Thin Mac board, we have to add a tiny circuit board for the extra multiplexer chip, or piggyback the chip over an existing chip. The board in Apple's 512K Mac has a slot for the multiplexer.

If we add the multiplexer and connect everything else up correctly, the result is logically identical to a true 512K Fat Mac. In fact, some Apple dealers tell me, the result may be even better—Apple's official upgrades occasionally cause problems for the power supply, whereas installers report no such problems with the unofficial route. Conceptually, then, getting the official Apple upgrade or upgrading a Thin Mac gets you the same results. The process is quite different, though.

If you take your Mac to an official Apple dealer for an upgrade, the dealer will open up your Mac case, take out the main circuit board, drop in a new 512K board, and either sell the old board back to Apple, save it to repair Thin Macs, or sell it to a true hacker. You have a Mac that might last slightly longer than it would have without the upgrade (you have all new components on the digital board), and you're out Apple's board price plus dealer installation.

If, on the other hand, you take your Mac to a firm that does an unofficial

It's your machine, and you're free to do what you want to it if you don't expect Apple to fix any damage afterwards.

upgrade, the cost will be less, but the process is a little more involved. You may have to leave your Macintosh overnight, because your upgrader will have a lot of fine soldering work to do.

According to Apple's Renée Rodrigue, the company reminds you that opening the case of a recently purchased Mac for any purpose voids the remainder of the warranty. Other than that, she says, Apple feels it's your machine, and you're free to do what you want to it if you don't expect Apple to fix any damage afterwards (you can buy a replacement main board from an Apple dealer, but you may not get the trade-in ["core charge"] back for a damaged or altered board). So be sure you trust your upgrader and check out what will happen if something goes wrong before he or she breaks that seal.

After opening the case, your trusty technician will remove the existing memory chips. Remember, those chips are soldered into place, and the circuit board is a four-layer model with tiny lines and pads, so this operation requires a high degree of skill. Conservative practice dictates sacrificing the old chips by cutting them away from their pins to simplify removing each pin individually, but some upgraders are equipped to remove chips in good enough shape to sell them as used but usable.

Many upgrade installers solder sockets into the chip positions that have just been vacated, but others solder the new chips directly into the board. The argu-



ment from the nonsocket side goes like this: You can't expect to upgrade the memory chips again beyond the 256K level, because the family of memory chips at 256K has no more unused pins; chips are more reliable when soldered in (that's why Apple did it originally); and the upgrader who wants to guarantee the work also needs to know that you won't be able to switch chips.

The prosocket side retorts that even memory chips fail in the field, and you don't want to have to keep soldering and desoldering your board. It's true that no compatible upgrade family beyond 256K now exists, but who knows what the IC makers may come up with next year. And, anyway, sockets are now almost as reliable as a direct soldered connection.

Whichever way it's done, after the chips are installed by direct soldering or in sockets, your installer adds the multi-

Several electronics enthusiasts that I spoke with said they had done their own upgrades and found it an easy process.

plexer chip, cuts a single trace on the printed circuit board, wires up fewer than a dozen connections to the added chip, and tests the result. If everything is set up correctly, all the supplies are available, and the phone doesn't have to be answered, the process can take as little as an hour or two.

If the upgrade process is so easy, should you just shop around for the lowest price? Not necessarily, since whoever does the job will be messing with the circuit board of your Macintosh.

Chris Griffen, whose Centa Systems in Agoura Hills, California, was one of the first to offer a commercial upgrade service, says that careful work habits are what make an upgrade successful. His firm has done well over a hundred conversions and hasn't yet lost a board. The upgrade can be done more cheaply than what he charges, he says, but an installer has to make enough money to be there if you ever need your Mac repaired. Like most upgrade firms, his offers a 90-day warranty on both the memory and the main board itself.

Similarly, Steve Orme from Berkeley Computer Systems in Berkeley, California, says that any installation service has to balance price against the amount of care and the warranty it offers. His store, which does both a retail and wholesale upgrade business, also warranties the complete main board for 90 days after upgrading a Mac to 512K status. In addition, he says, you can expect his firm to be there in the years to come if you ever need service.

On the other hand, several electronics enthusiasts that I spoke with said they had done their own upgrades and found it an easy process. The hardest part, providing you're handy with a fine-tip soldering iron, is opening up the Macintosh case.

If you want to try the upgrade yourself, don't rely on this necessarily general description. You can find a step-by-step description of the procedure in the MAUG SIG (the Apple special-interest group) on CompuServe or in the January 1985 issue of *Dr. Dobbs Journal* (\$3.50 by mail from M&T Publishing, 2664 Embarcadero Way, Palo Alto, CA 94303). See also "The Mac According to Hogan" in this issue for some extra tips. Keep a steady hand on that soldering iron, and watch out for static.

ERGONOMICS

► APPLEWORDS BY STEVE ROSENTHAL

A short glossary of terms for use with 'Ergo, Ergonomics,' page 25

AMBER SCREEN

A monochrome (one-color) monitor screen that shows text and graphics as amber and black. Some people insist that amber is easier on the eyes than black and white or green, and amber monitors are very popular in Europe. Controlled studies, however, have not found a difference in either productivity or eyestrain between similar-quality amber and green monitors.

ANTIGLARE SCREEN

A CRT screen that has been treated to reduce the amount of light reflected off the front of the glass. Common treatment techniques include etching (slightly roughening) the surface, coating it with a thin optical filter, and placing a fine nylon-mesh net in front of the screen.

CIRCULAR POLARIZER

A type of filter that reduces the amount of light and glare reflected from a CRT screen. The polarizer keeps light that has passed through the filter from the outside—and been reflected from the screen—from passing back out, but it allows most of the light from the phosphor inside the CRT to pass through. You can add a polarizer to most Apple monitors.

CONTRAST RATIO

The factor by which the lightest part of a display is brighter than the darkest. Too large a contrast ratio makes the screen seem stark, and too little contrast makes it look flat and hard to read. Large LCDs, such as the 80-

column display for the Apple IIc, have much lower contrast ratios than do CRTs, which makes the LCDs harder to read.

DETACHED KEYBOARD

A keyboard that connects to the computer or terminal by a cord, rather than being built into a larger unit. Most ergonomics experts say a detached keyboard is better for long sessions because it allows you to position the keyboard where you want it and to change your posture every so often. In the Apple lineup, only the Macintosh comes with a detached keyboard, but you can buy add-on external keyboards for the II, II Plus, and IIe.

DIN 4549

The German standard for office furniture and work spaces. It is widely cited as an example of ergonomic requirements. Among other provisions, the standard calls for work spaces containing terminals or computers to have work surfaces that are 72 cm (29 inches) above the floor, at least 80 cm (32 inches) deep, and 160 cm (64 inches) wide. Legroom must be at least 65 cm (26 inches) high and wide, and chairs must be adjustable. Each workstation must have at least 8 square meters (about 26 square feet) of floor area or 12 square meters (about 40 square feet) if it is in an open area. Keyboard thickness must be not more than 30 mm (about 1 inch), and there must be 5 to 10 cm (about 2 to 4 inches) of room in front of the keyboard for a wrist rest.

ENVIRONMENTAL LIGHTING

The general light level in the workplace. Especially in offices where people are using computers, the light level should be diffuse and subdued, with more light focused where needed. Most authorities recommend 400 to 500 lux (equal to 30 to 40 footcandles—see *Lumen* entry).

ERGONOMICS

The study of the interaction between people and their work, particularly their tools and workplaces. *Ergonomic* is a coined word, meaning the science of work (ergon).

ETCHED

Applied to the faceplate or screen of a CRT, a slight roughening with a faint pattern of dots or lines. The roughening causes only a small amount of blurring of the light coming out, but it significantly reduces the reflection of light from the outside coming off the glass. Apple monitors have etched faceplates.

FLICKER

As applied to video images, a regular pulsation in brightness of the entire picture or a part of it. Brightness flicker is the pulsation in large areas at high brightness. Interline flicker refers to the small sparkles that show around the edges of objects. You can reduce flicker by increasing the field rate (the speed at which images are shown), by reducing brightness, or by using a longer-persistence phosphor.

LOW-PROFILE KEYBOARD

A keyboard that rests close to the work surface, particularly one meeting the German DIN standards. These standards call for a home row not more than 30 mm (1.2 inches) high, with a 5-to-15-degree keyboard slope (12 degrees is best). Although Apple keyboards don't meet this standard, you can buy add-ons for the II family that do.

LUMEN

A unit of light intensity. It is the amount of light that passes through a specified angle (1-degree solid angle) from a standard candle. One lumen per square foot is a footcandle; one lumen per square meter is one lux.

MATTE FINISH

A slightly roughened finish that reflects light diffusely. Matte finish on components, such as the housings of monitors or keyboards, can reduce reflection and glare.

MESH

A fine nylon net that you place in front of a video screen to cut reflected glare. Nylon-mesh glare screens are inexpensive, but they are hard to clean and only partially effective.

OPTICAL COATING

A thin chemical layer applied to the surface of a display tube to decrease the reflectance of light from outside back to the viewer.

POSITIVE

In referring to screen images, those images made up of dark lines and dots on a lighter background. Most ergonomic standards prefer this mode, but it requires a higher-quality display to prevent visible flicker.



Comfort and well-being for computer users

Keystroking an Apple certainly isn't as dangerous as working with radioactive materials, but long-term exposure to uncomfortable furniture, inadequate lighting, and insufficient ventilation can produce a myriad of illnesses, ranging from tendinitis to a reduced ability to distinguish colors.

Concern over these health hazards has led to government-funded research, in this country and abroad, to determine methods of coping with computer-related physical as well as emotional ailments—ranging from thrombophlebitis (blood clots) due to uncomfortable seating to feelings of worker isolation. As a result of growing public concern over these health hazards, more than a dozen states are considering legislation to govern the office use of video-display units. The legislation calls for safeguards such as mandatory eye exams, work rotation, and adjustable desks and chairs.

Studies of computer users point out that a well-designed workplace is critical to worker comfort and safety. A 1983 National Research Council report concludes, "With proper design of VDT display, lighting and work stations . . . VDT work need not cause any unique visual problems."

Enter Ergonomics


Furniture manufacturers have begun to pay more attention to ergonomics—from the Greek, *ergos* (work) and *nomos* (natural laws)—the study of de-

signing the work environment to meet human needs. This behavorial science, also known as "human-factors engineering," had its start during World War II in the design of aircraft controls and pilot seating. During the past two decades, ergonomics has increasingly focused on product design, drawing upon the fields of anatomy, physiology, and psychology.

With the growth of automated work and the white-collar sector, office furniture has become more ergonomic and now includes a variety of products—introduced since the 1970s—that exclusively support the desktop computer. Many of the most advanced designs come from Europe. European manufacturers adhere to strict government regulations, as a result of pressure from strong white-collar unions in countries such as West Germany and Sweden.

American furniture manufacturers have rushed to keep pace with these foreign imports, but this country has no mandatory standards governing design, manufacture, or use of computer-support furniture. Nevertheless, the number of products on the market has never been greater. They range from work surfaces that you can lower or raise up to six inches—with separate surfaces for monitors and keyboards—to chairs that you can angle, tilt, and swivel in almost any direction. Although the market for computer-support furniture has


increased, seven out of ten personalcomputer users are not aware that this furniture exists, according to a recent study by the Business Projects Consulting Group, of Centerport, New York.

If you want to set up a computerized work area at home, what should you look for? Begin by determining how frequently you use your Apple. As ergonomics expert Jon Ryburg of the Facility Management Institute in Ann Arbor, Michigan, points out, "Ergonomics becomes really important when you spend more than a third of your time at the computer." If you are a constant user, insist on adjustable chairs, work surfaces, and lighting, so that you can adjust your environment to suit your comfort.

Furniture Design

The most rapid advances in ergonomic-furniture design center on the chair, no doubt because back disorders are the number 1 cause of worker absenteeism, affecting 50-80% of the population. A 1980 Louis Harris poll conducted for Steelcase, the largest U.S. manufacturer of furniture, found that 54% of surveyed workers felt that the comfort of their chairs affected their performance. Indeed, the current preoccupation with increased productivity on the part of American management has boosted the development of ergonomic chairs that incorporate a (continued on page 32)

Thoracic support: The contoured backrest adjusts up and down, forward and backward, and remains in constant contact with the user's back, regardless of the tilt angle.

Lumbar (lower-back) support: Contoured seat sides support pelvic rotation and backward and forward motion, regardless of the tilt angle. Seat-angle adjustment: The pivot allows the feet to remain on the floor.

The foam construction is not too soft—it is firm enough to cushion and support the body.

Sit Comfortably

When trying out a chair in a store, check that yo hips and knees are at right angles and your fe flat on the floor. Remember, though, that few pe ple maintain this posture for long. Research show that a sitter changes positions every eight to to minutes. Be sure that you can raise or lower to seat of the chair; experts recommend six to not inches of movement, from a height of 16 to inches. Many so-called ergonomic chairs now it corporate gas-lift mechanisms, which make sea height adjustment as easy as pressing a buttender the seat.

The front edge of a seat should be rounded "scrolled" so that it doesn't cut into the back your legs and restrict blood flow to the thighs ar feet. The seat cushion should be lightly padded that any pressure exerted on the buttocks can shifted. If too soft, a cushion can cause pressu under the thighs and thrust the hip bones forwar It should be constructed in a material th "breathes," to avoid trapping body heat and pospiration, which can lead to rashes and other infections,

To support the lumbar region of the spine proceed erly, a chair's backrest should fit snugly into the small of your back and tilt backward and forward accommodate seated movement—at an angle some to 120 degrees, measured from the seat. To a just to the lower back, the backrest should be at to move up and down two inches or more.

If the chair reclines, it should have a headre but it should not push the head forward. Armreare important in reducing shoulder and arm t tigue. They should be short enough to allow t chair to be drawn up to the work surface and, ic ally, be adjustable in height.

To provide stability, the base of the chair shot be five-pronged. If a leg should break off from the type of base, the remaining prongs will remain firmly and safely on the floor. For mobility, choose a swivel base on casters.

Checklist

In choosing a chair, consider the following:

- 1. Is the chair height easily adjustable from t seated position?
- 2. Does the backrest adequately support the low lumbar region of the spine?
- 3. Does the backrest tilt backward and forward
- 4. Can it be adjusted up and down?
- 5. Do armrests interfere with movement?
- 6. Does the seat have a rounded front edge?
- 7. Is the chair adequately padded?
- 8. Does the chair feature a five-legged base w casters?





BEYOND THE FIXTURE ITSELF, PROPER LIGHTING DEPENDS UPON SPECIFIC ROOM CONDITIONS AND THE PLACEMENT OF YOUR COMPUTER MONITOR.

Let There Be (Glare-Free) Light

Your Apple should be positioned so that the incidence of light from overhead fixtures is as close to 45° on the monitor as possible.

Selecting the proper lighting for your computer workstation is a much more difficult task than choosing furniture or accessories, since it is dependent on specific room conditions and the placement of the computer monitor. Not only must the lighting fixture illuminate the screen—a source of light and reflection in itself—but it must also light the keyboard and adjacent paper documents on the desk. In addition, the general level of room lighting should be bright enough to avoid the eye-



walls or ceiling with a directly focused, adjustable task lamp on the side of your desk that you use for paperwork. The brightness of the ambient lighting should range from 30 to 50 footcandles (about half the level of brightness in an ordinary, paper-pushing office), according to the AOA, and task lighting should be at a level of 70 footcandles. (A light meter that gives a reading in footcandles is available from General Electric Company.) If you use overhead fixtures to illuminate the computer screen, the incidence of light should be as close to a 45-degree angle as possible on the monitor to avoid veiling reflections and glare.

Filters that fit over the computer screen are another way of reducing glare, but they may diminish contrast, character visibility, and brightness.

Apple Computer, Inc. has improved display visibility on the Macintosh with black characters on a white background. Known as "negative contrast" or "positive presentation," this type of display "reduces the effects of veiling reflections on the screen and may help to reduce problems of adapting to the different luminance levels of the VDT and surrounding objects," according to the National Research Council.

If you work near a window, be sure that your Apple monitor is placed at right angles to it, so that incoming sunlight doesn't shine directly into your eyes or from behind you onto the screen. Stick to neutral tones when choosing colors for your work surface, in order to prevent extreme, competing contrasts in brightness between desktop and display. Matte, rather than shiny, finishes are recommended to prevent light bouncing off the work surface onto the screen.

When choosing light fixtures, try to stay away from fluorescent tubes. Not only do some of these tubes produce an unnatural, greenish-white light, but they also have a tendency to flicker when tubes are wearing out or circuits are faulty. Some researchers believe fluorescent lamps cause long-term health risks, from fatigue to cell mutations.

More soothing to the eyes—and to the psyche—are halogen lamps; common incandescent bulbs; and the newly developed Norelco PL13 fluorescent bulb and Vita Lite, manufactured by the Duro-Test Corporation of North Bergen, New Jersey. All of these luminaires emit bright, warm light. Vita Lite produces a mix of broad-spectrum colors that simulate natural daylight, which, according to recent studies, has been found to cure everything from depression to jet lag.

Checklist

When selecting your lighting, be sure to consider the following points:

- 1. Is the level of illumination from the fixture adequate for computer use?
- 2. Is the light flicker-free?
- 3. Is the fixture covered with glare shields or an adjustable shade?
- 4. Can you easily position the lamp to avoid glare and reflections?
- 5. Are the windows near your work space covered with blinds, curtains, or other means of controlling daylight?



high degree of built-in design flexibility to accommodate a variety of postures and body sizes. The research these designs reflect shows that computer work involves a variety of sitting positions from leaning over the desk to reclining-that change every eight to ten minutes. States Niels Diffrient, an industrial designer who has won awards for his chair designs, "Sitting is an athletic activity. Tasks such as typing put a 30% additional load on the spine."

Although experts agree that a "good" chair design must pay attention to the lumbar region of the spine just above the pelvic bone, to the buttocks, and to the popliteal (backs of the thighs), translating these anatomical concerns into physical reality has produced various results. Bill Stumpf, a Minnesota industrial designer who has produced several outstanding furniture designs for Herman Miller, Inc., explains, "Ergonomics is not a hard science in the sense that some sciences are. If it were, chairs would tend to look more alike than they do now."

What the ergonomic specialists agree on is that seating should conform to several criteria: a rounded front edge, A work surface should be wide and deep enough to accommodate a computer's terminal. keyboard, task lighting, and document holder, as well as provide for height, angle, and tilt adjustments for proper monitor viewing.


Working Surfaces

Ideally, your desk should be as flexibly designed as your chair. For a relaxed hand position, keyboards and displays should be positioned at different heights, the keyboard lower than the standard 29inch desk height. Many of the computer-support desks and terminal stands currently available feature separately adjustable surfaces for monitors and keyboards, which you can move up, down, or sideways with a lever, crank, or other mechanism. Some monitor-support surfaces can tilt up to 15 degrees, so you can adjust viewing angles and rotate for shared use.

Checklist

Consider the following questions when you are planning your work surface:

- 1. Are there separate work surfaces for keyboards and displays?
- 2. Can you tilt the work surfaces and adjust their height?
- 3. Does adequate space exist for storing copies, manuals, documents, and personal belongings?
- 4. Is the work surface deep enough so that you can place your monitor at a preferred distance?
- 5. Is the legroom adequate to accommodate different postures?
- 6. Can you rest your arms when you are not typing?
- 7. Can you route the computer wiring out of the way through the desktop?
- 8. Are work surfaces nonreflective?



als. Some experts predict that this furniture will give way to workstations that integrate electronics. Niels Diffrient, for example, has designed a desk prototype for Sunar Hauserman that incorporates a computer, disk drive, printer, cabling, paper, and disk storage.

Lighting Design

Of the complaints associated with computers, the most common are related to the eyes. Research conducted by the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) shows that 91% of the computer operators surveyed reported eyestrain, and 80%


experienced burning eyes. Many of these visual problems stem directly from harsh lighting that produces glare. If you find yourself shielding your eyes or your Apple monitor from irritating reflections, you, too, may be suffering from glare.

A Glaring Problem

Glare can be either direct or indirect. Direct glare occurs when light shines from a fixture directly into the eyes. Indirect glare occurs when light emitted from one source onto a surface reflects back from that surface and into the eyes. This type of glare is referred to as a "veiling reflection," since it causes the surface onto which it is reflected to appear washed out, as if the viewer were looking through a veil.

The easiest way to prevent glare is to make sure that your Apple is positioned away from a window and away from direct sunlight. You can avoid irritating reflection from shiny and brightly colored ceilings, walls, desktops, and clothing by placing neutral, matte-finished objects and surfaces in front of the computer, with darker finishes behind you to absorb the light.

Crucial to reducing both glare and eyestrain is proper lighting design to illuminate your monitor, adjacent paper documents, and the room itself. The challenge in lighting the computer, which is a source of light in itself, is to



find a way to balance two different sets of activities: reading printed copy, which assumes a sight line 20 to 40 degrees lower than the horizontal at a distance of 16 inches, while viewing the screen, which assumes a horizontal sight line at a distance of 24 inches from the monitor to the eyes (for a solution to this problem, see "Let There Be [Glare-Free] Light" page 28).

Glare and poor lighting design may not be the only factors behind computer-related eyestrain. Dr. Melvin Schrier, a fellow of the American Academy of Optometry and member of the Illuminating Engineering Society,

maintains, "The major reason people have VDT (visual display terminal)-related eye problems is that they have not been tested for this type of work." Both NIOSH and the American Optometric Association (AOA) recommend annual eye checkups for testing of near-point acuity, binocularity, and convergence visual skills that come into play when you work at a video display. Another visual problem that may plague computer users more than others is presbyopia-presby (old) and opia (eyes)—a type of reading difficulty that begins to affect people who are 35 and older, involving loss of lens accommodation and decrease in pupil size.

In addition, the eyeglasses or contact lenses that you wear may not be corrected for computer-screen viewing distances. Normal reading eyeglasses are designed for use with a 12-to 16-inch distance between the eyes and the paper; the computer screen requires a distance of 24 inches. Bifocal wearers encounter fatigue by looking from lower (reading) lenses to upper lenses. The AOA recommends that bifocal wearers obtain special multiple lenses for computer viewing, depending on the conditions in their workspace. 

cause of cataracts and retinal damage.

One of the simplest ways to avoid evestrain is to take a 15-minute break away from your Apple every two hours, as suggested by NIOSH. Another way is to position the monitor so that the viewing angle is 10 to 20 degress below the horizontal plane at eye level.

Be sure that you properly maintain your Apple in order to ensure a sharp screen image, display contrast, and proper refresh rate. You can cure a computer that flickers during use in a brightly lit room by dimming the room lighting and adjusting the brightness level of the screen.

> Don't forget aesthetics when you buy furniture, lighting, or any other computersupport item.

Other factors to consider in setting the scene for your Apple are the envirnomental conditions surrounding your work area. Room humidity should be within the 40-60% range. Air that is too dry generates static electricity, which can interfere with a computer's electromagnetic field, and air that is too moist can be detrimental to disk and paper storage.

Be sure your work area is adequately ventilated to cope with the heat output from your Apple. Fresh-air circulation is important to prevent the buildup of airborne toxins from common materials such as plywood, particle board, and foam insulation, all of which give off formaldehyde, a cause of skin, eye, and respiratory irritation.

Finally, don't forget aesthetics when you buy furniture, lighting, or any other computer-support item. No matter how ergonomic they are, you probably won't use them if their designs are completely at odds with your decor and sense of well-being. Don't hesitate to consult a local architect or interior designer for information on how to order the latest products. Remember, beauty may lie in the eye of the beholder, but comfort



ow you can create your own fantasy world and then challenge your friends to solve the mind-grinding problems that you've dreamed up. Writing an adventure can be as much fun as playing one, and with programs such as Adventure Master, AdventureWriter, and Eamon Dungeon Designer, you won't even have to know a bit from a byte.

Before setting out to design a new world, however, you should know a bit about how an adventure game actually works. All such programs store the descriptions of their caves, castles, and characters in a database. When you type a command such as open chest, a group of formulas called the parser analyzes the words, consults the database, and displays the appropriate description or reply. Each of the programs we'll look at asks you for the names and descriptions of everything in your adventure, and then it automatically generates the necessary database. You can revise its contents at any time, which is why this kind of program is often called a database editor. To examine these editors thoroughly, I used each one to design a different version of an adventure I called Ouest for Hoffa.

Adventure Master

This program simplifies the construction of adventures in which you can depict some rooms with three-color graphics as well as with text. You use a joystick or the keyboard to draw the pictures and enter textual descriptions, room connections, and other information via one of the main menu's ten other options. After selecting an option such as Edit Objects or Room Description, you type the number of the room you want to edit, and the appropriate screen appears and prompts you for information.

The process resembles that of enter-

ing names and addresses in a filing system such as PFS:File. Instead of Name and Street, each type of data (Description, Needed Object, Key Phrase, and so on) appears on the screen, followed by a blank area where you key in the text. To change a previous entry, you merely type over any existing material. The same data-entry scheme facilitates adding new commands that the program will understand if a player uses them in the game. (Eighteen commonly used commands such as Look, Take, and Save Game are already built in.)


fter you've filled a screen in, you have the choice of erasing it and starting over or saving it on the disk that will hold your new game. The Test feature lets you play the game in its current state and then return to the editor to make changes. You can save your work in progress to disk at any stage. When the game's done, Adventure Master saves it in a format that can run independently, so your friends won't need the editor to load and play your game.

The final product won't be as expansive as other adventures created with similar programs, because Adventure Master limits your world to 50 rooms (more if fewer than ten are illustrated), 32 objects, and 50 to 100 commands

with individual text responses. It also places more restrictions on how you incorporate these elements into a game. You can put only one object in each room, for example, and each object must form a puzzle in itself. When adding a shovel to a room, I had to type in a phrase that hinted that an object was hidden there. Then I specified the words and/or objects the player had to use in order to discover and obtain it.

A good adventure game should contain at least one dark cave or room in which the adventurer needs a torch or lantern to see its contents. Unfortunately, Adventure Master provides no method for checking to see if a player is carrying a light source. I found a way to achieve this effect, but not as well as I wanted. Other minor limitations cropped up as I tinkered with the editor, but the most frustrating—to me, anyway—was that there was no way to kill a player who walked off a cliff or did anything else that ought to be fatal.

Adventure Master was the easiest of the three programs to learn and operate. The 25-page manual offers clear instructions and examples for each phase of game development. The package includes three sample adventures, and you can scrutinize their databases for examples of effective ways to apply the various features. Two of the games





have no endings, and you can learn a lot by completing these before starting a new one from scratch. This option makes this program especially well suited for teenagers as young as 14 and for families who want to collaborate on new games for other family members to play.

AdventureWriter

AdventureWriter is a more complex program than Adventure Master, and thus it took me longer to write Quest for Hoffa with this program. The extra effort paid off, though, because I was able to invent problems based on a wider range of questions: Had the player visited a certain room, how many objects was he carrying, had he found enough food and water to survive?

dventureWriter automatically checks to see if the player is carrying a light source, and I finally got to waste the careless adventurer who stumbled off that cliff. Another handy feature lets you print out hard copy of any section of the database to produce a list of all the locations or objects, for example.

Each element of a new game—locations, objects, vocabulary, conditions, messages—is continued in one of 17 individual submenus that you access from the main menu. The trickiest part is learning the 36 code words that indicate the conditions under which certain events will occur. Under the command examine shovel, for example, I had to key in this line: AT 3 MESSAGE 5. which means that if the player is in room 3 (where the shovel is located) when he types examine shovel, then message 5 (which describes that item) will appear. The initial vocabulary holds 30 common words, which you can edit, delete, or reinforce with your own nouns and verbs until you reach the limit of 255 words.

AdventureWriter games can have as many as 252 different places with up to objects scattered throughout them—I had no trouble placing several objects in the same room. The database also has space for 255 messages, which are displayed when the player fulfills the conditions you prescribe. You can edit or delete any existing entry and/or add new ones. Graphics are not available, but I added sound effects and music by picking notes from the program's three-octave range. (The manufacturer is working on a new version with graphic capabilities so you'll be able to illustrate the rooms.)

The 115-page manual steps you

through a tutorial adventure in which you write a small game, and the reference section explains the code words and every other aspect of the system. It fails to provide the correct instructions for the unconventional method with which Apple IIc users must format a disk for use with the program, though. The company maintains a toll-free hot line for technical problems such as this, and my query found a quick answer. A representative assured me that proper instructions will be included in an upcoming addendum to the manual.

It takes more time and patience to master than Adventure Master, but AdventureWriter puts a larger and more powerful set of tools in your hands. You don't have to have the application-generating program to play an adventure written with it, and the manufacturer assists authors in marketing well-written adventures.

AdventureWriter is appropriate for anyone who has solved several adventure games—the same kind of logical thinking and attention to detail you need to solve adventures are a prerequisite for writing the more-complex games this system can produce.

Eamon Dungeon Designer

Eamon is a public-domain fantasy/role-playing game that differs from traditional adventures by focusing on combat with orcs and other monsters rather than on logical problem solving. It resembles the game Wizardry, but without the graphics. In a typical game, you begin in the Main Hall, where the program "rolls up" a character with the attributes of hardiness, charisma, and agility. After your orc-slayer shops for weapons, armor, and magic spells, it's off to the adventure of your choice.

amon's action consists mostly of typing commands such as Attack dragon and reading the results of your attack and the monster's immediate counterattack. The goal of each game is simply to increase your character's attributes by victory in battle and to collect as much loot as you possibly can. (You can store characters on the disk and revive them for use in different adventures). A game called Beginner's Cave is included on the master disk, which you need in order to play any Eamon adventure.

On the flip side of the master, you'll find the Dungeon Designer. Like the other editors, this one consists of several menu-driven phases in which you lay out rooms and place objects, monsters, and effects within them by typing in the


appropriate information. You can easily assemble a relatively simple role-playing game with a maximum of 100 of any of the 4 elements: rooms, monsters, effects, and objects. It delivers hard copy of any part of the database, and several utility programs are available to considerably reduce the amount of work you'll have to do.

The system's most annoying aspect is that the main menu's items represent different programs, which are loaded individually when you select them. After finishing with the Edit Dungeon Data option, for example, you must reboot the main disk in order to access other options. The documentation is stored on the disk as text files that can be displayed on the screen, but it doesn't cover the system's numerous idiosyncrasies and special features in detail. (Serious dungeon designers should consider joining the National Eamon Users' Club.)

nlike the other editors. Eamon gives you access to the main program that actually runs the game. With a minimal foundation in Applesoft BASIC, you'll be able to design more customized games with a wide range of special effects. This knowledge is necessary if you want to alter the existing 30word vocabulary, for instance, or invent your own special effects. The best thing about Eamon is the price—the Master/ Dungeon Design disk costs a mere \$5, and the 81 user-written games that are also in the public domain sell for \$2.50 to \$5 each. After playing one game, you can load it into the editor to dissect and study it and then list the main program to see how it was modified by that game's author. If you've ever started to learn BASIC but got bored with the sample programs, try Eamon-it gives you something fun to do with BASIC.

If you plan to learn programming anyway, don't dismiss the thought of using one of these editors. Working with such a program provides a painless way to absorb the principles of programming. You'll soon recognize the value of designing a game on paper before booting the editor, which is the equivalent of writing a program's flow chart. Matching possible words and commands with the conditions required for them to cause specific effects is the same as writing IF THEN statements in BASIC.

In short, the logical thinking fundamental to designing a game with a database editor also forms the basis of programming in any language. Even if





ould you like to see what you can do with Apple's new LaserWriter printer? If you would like your computer to talk to the Laser-Writer, the conversation has to take place in the PostScript typesetting and

graphics language.

The PostScript language, which was written by Adobe Systems and licensed to Apple, is built into every Laser-Writer. You can send the LaserWriter a PostScript message from an Apple II, a Macintosh, or from any other computer with an RS-232 serial port. In addition, any AppleTalk-equipped computer can connect to the LaserWriter through the AppleTalk network.

Writing the PostScript statements that make the LaserWriter produce the output you want is a form of programming. In this series of articles, I'll attempt to present the basic principles, structures, and commands you'll need to understand the way PostScript programs operate. If you have access to a LaserWriter, with the help of this series and perhaps the PostScript manual, you may want to try writing some Post-Script routines of your own.

If you don't want to program in PostScript, you don't have to learn to do so just to use a LaserWriter. Apple provides a general PostScript printer driver for the Mac, and many software houses are including PostScript printer drivers in their upcoming application programs. Whether for intellectual exercise, a need for better control, or just for fun, you may want to find out what PostScript allows you to do, however.




Figure 1: PostScript stores its working values by pushing them onto and popping them back off an ordered list called a stack. The last item saved is the first retrieved.

PostScript is a stack-oriented language, keeping its working values, definitions, and intermediary results in a set of ordered lists. It is more like Forth than like BASIC or Pascal. In general, it uses values and objects immediately or it pushes them onto a stack. When the program needs data or encounters a command to retrieve a value, it pops a value back off the top of the stack again (see figure 1).

PostScript is also an extensible language, meaning that you can define routines in terms of basic PostScript operations and then use these new terms as part of further definitions. When the LaserWriter interprets your PostScript program, it follows each new The first part of a four-part tutorial on using the language of the LaserWriter printer




Figure 2: You can add your own definitions to the existing PostScript command set and use both existing commands and your new ones in further definitions or routines.

term back through your definition until it reaches a description made up of primitive operations that it knows how to perform (see figure 2).

As a complement to the threadedstack structure of the language, most PostScript operations are written in postfix—you first list the objects you want to use, and you then say what you want to do with them. For example, to add 3 and 4, you write

34 add

rather than the

infix form you would use in BASIC or ordinary math. This procedure makes it possible for PostScript to evaluate objects according to a set of simple rules, although it does make the programs harder for beginners to read and write.

In general, PostScript works its way through a program as follows. As the computer reads each set of symbols, PostScript figures out where the breaks are between the words and assigns each group to a logical unit called a token. As soon as a token becomes available, PostScript looks to see what type of obiect it represents.

If the token is a number, PostScript saves it for later use by pushing it onto

the operand stack. It does the same for definitions and specially marked command routines intended for later use. If, on the other hand, the token is a name. PostScript checks to see if it represents an executable routine or a primitive operation. If it does, the language executes the statement, pulling as many values off the stack as the operation requests and returning any results back onto the stack.

The basic scheme, then, is first to define any new terms and push them onto the stack. You then supply the values you want the program to work with. Finally, you give the commands that will retrieve the values, do the required arithmetic and logic, and print out the result. In practice, it's slightly more complicated, and we usually alternate between adding values to the stack and popping them back off.

We'll get to a concrete example in just a moment, but first let's take a short detour into the way PostScript handles stack operations. PostScript actually has four distinct stacks: operand, execution, dictionary, and graphic states (see figure 3). A different class of operations affects each stack.

The operand stack is much like a piece of scratch paper or the running total on a calculator. If an operation

needs input values, it pops the required number of values from the operand stack. Similarly, any results produced go back on the stack for later use. This holds true for both arithmetic operations and those that handle text.

The execution stack is where Post-Script stores away your program. Normally, you don't explicitly work with this stack but let PostScript do the stack management as it works its way through your program.

The dictionary stack lets you create new definitions and save libraries of procedures. PostScript searches this stack for your definitions, then for built-in operations, and flags any terms that it can't find in either.

Finally, the graphics-state stack is a

TRY IT YOURSELF

If you have access to a LaserWriter and want to try some PostScript examples, here is the procedure. You need your computer, an ordinary communications program (such as Access II or MacTerminal), and either an RS-232 serial port or AppleTalk. If you use a serial connection, set your communications parameters to 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, no parity, and the X-ON/X-OFF protocol. You can use 1200 bps (set the Mode control on the LaserWriter to 1), 9600 bps (Mode 2), or AppleTalk (Mode 3). Send the LaserWriter a Control-D to stop any current job, a Control-T to have it report the job's status, and the Executive command to tell it to echo back commands as it receives them. Then, enter your PostScript programs.

holding area for sets of parameters that define how the PostScript language interfaces to a specific printer or interprets the exact graphic commands in your program. PostScript can keep track of several sets of parameters, which makes it possible temporarily to alter graphics characteristics in order to draw certain objects and then return to the original mode.

The Simplest Possible Program

We've done enough theory to start now with some practical examples. We'll begin with the simplest useful PostScript routine,

copypage

a one-line program that tells the LaserWriter to produce a printout of the current page. Because we haven't said to write anything on the page and the LaserWriter assumes a blank white page to begin with, this routine will simply eject an empty sheet of paper.

Next, we'll make the routine a bit more complex. Suppose we want two blank pages. The routine then becomes

2 {copypage} repeat

and PostScript, as it reads this line, first encounters the 2. Remember, Post-Script pushes values it encounters in the input stream onto the operand stack until they are needed. So the 2 is pushed onto that stack.

Then, PostScript finds {copypage}. Curly brackets tell PostScript that it should save the enclosed commands, rather than execute them. The program treats deferred commands as a special form of text input—as operands to be saved on the operand stack until they're called for. That's what happens to the {copypage}.


Proceeding along, PostScript then finds the repeat. Repeat is a word that it understands as an executable command that takes two operands. Going back to the stack, repeat treats the object on the top of the stack as a sequence of commands to execute and the next object on the stack as the number of repetitions to make.

The object on the top of the stack is



copypage, which still prints out the current page. The next object is the repeat factor, which in this case is 2. The LaserWriter responds by printing two blank pages.

Now, we'd like to add some text to the page. In order to do so, we'll have to gather up some more PostScript tools. To print text, we'll need to use fonts, arrays, and a positioning command.

Before PostScript can place text within a page image, it has to know what type style and size you want to use. For this example, let's use Times Roman.

The first token in our statement is

/Times-Roman

which is the name of the font, preceded by a slash. The slash tells PostScript that Times-Roman is a name that it should put on the operand stack, rather than interpreting it. Otherwise, Post-Script would look at the name Times-Roman, decide that it wasn't a built-in command or a word already defined, and flag it as an error.

With Times Roman on the stack, we can then issue a command to select it for use. Our line then becomes


/Times-Roman findfont

and the findfont tells PostScript to locate the dictionary of information about the font whose name is on top of the operand stack and push all the information about that font onto the operand stack.

Fonts are generally stored in a reference size, rather than in the actual size of letters that we'd probably want to use. PostScript uses a one-point-high font as the reference (about 1/72-inch high), which it can do because it is able to scale fonts smoothly up in size without creating jagged lines.

The operator called scalefont takes the scale factor from the top of the operand stack and the font information from underneath it. We've set the font

name, but we need the number. To put a number on the stack, we include it in a command as a separate token. Putting these elements together, we get the command

/Times-Roman findfont 12 scalefont

Finally, with the font all specified, we add one more command to make it the current font, until further notice.

The first lines now read

/Times-Roman findfont 12 scalefont setfont

Now that we have a font, the next step is to specify where on the page we want the typing to start. The most basic positioning command in PostScript is moveto, which tells the LaserWriter which point on the page to use as the starting point for further graphics or text commands.

Naturally enough, since a page is two-dimensional, moveto takes two numeric values as its inputs. In stacklanguage form, the two values must be on the stack already when we execute the moveto. The command line to start at halfway up the page, about an inch from the left margin, is 72 396 moveto, with 0,0 at the bottom left of the page

and 72 units to an inch.

In PostScript, the operator to place text on the page image is show, which takes a string for an input, places the characters on the image, and advances the current location point as it goes. The string input, as you've probably guessed, must first be placed on the operand stack.

Strings in PostScript are made up of sequences of characters. We can create these sequences with operators, or as literal elements. We'll start with literals. You set strings off by enclosing them in parentheses. Our text string is, therefore

(This page intentionally not left blank)

and the command to place the text on the page

(this page intentionally) show (not left blank) show

These two lines will print as one—I broke them here to fit the magazine's column width. That gets the print on the image, and we already know that it is put on the paper with showpage.

It took quite a bit of doing, but we now have a complete PostScript program. To print our single line on the page, we run the program

/Times-Roman findfont 12 scalefont setfont

72 396 moveto

(this page intentionally) show (not left blank) show

showpage

That's enough instruction to get you started. We've seen that PostScript is a stack-oriented language, and we've worked a little bit with the stacks. We've written a short program and seen the very basics of how to get an image on a page. On the way, we've run into commands, deferred commands, arithmetic, strings, arrays, and graphics. And we've gotten the printer actually to spit out a printed page.

Next time, we'll take a closer look at the PostScript graphics commands and what we can do with them. Following that, we'll go back to text in more detail. Finally, in the last installment, we'll look at how to use PostScript in application programs. Stay tuned.



They're not cropping up in every forest the way they used to, but you still have a range of choices.

COMPUTER

No, you don't have to send your children to a computer camp to ensure they'll survive the high-tech 80s, but if you want to make them more comfortable with computer tools, a good computer camp can teach them that computers are not only useful but also fun.

You don't see computer camps cropping up in every forest the way you used to.

Think about what you're looking for first and then search out a camp that offers it.

A couple of years ago, computer camps were the latest craze in children's summer diversions. They were billed as the only way to ensure that budding executives-inthe-rough would be able to comprehend the world of the future.

Now, however, the fad has faded, as children work more with computers at home and at school and the computer mystique is dispersing on its own. There's still a place for computer camps, though, whether your son or daughter craves an intensive "computer experience" or simply wants to work with computers as part of a more traditional camping session. Computer camps are rarely cheap, but what camps are? The object is to have a good time and learn.

CAMPS

What Is a Computer Camp?

The term "computer camp" is bandied about in classified ads as much as the term "user-friendly." If you're a parent contemplating sending a child to computer camp, it behooves you to think about what you're looking for first and then search out a camp that offers it, as you would with software.

Many traditional camps advertise computer facilities and instruction as an adjunct to their regular offerings of hiking, swimming, team sports, and crafts. Let the buyer beware here. You probably won't find computer instruction emphasized in this kind of setup; it's more likely to be an elective activity. Fine, if that's what you want, but don't expect computers to be the main event.

Look out for the other extreme, that of excluding everything else for the sake of grinding away at the computer. The weighting of different activities is a minor bone of contention among camp directors, some of whom say camps that don't balance computer instruction with a near-equal amount of recreational activities are

"clinics," not camps.

Mark Zacovic, executive director of ExperCamp (formerly The Original Computer Camp), says, "We don't think the hacker life-style is a balanced one," and adds that ExperCamp goes out of its way to provide well-rounded role models for campers, "not the pale, bespectacled, greasy-haired" classic computer nerd.

Michael Zabinski of National Computer Camps, on the other hand, scoffs at that style of computer camp, saying that "computer camps in the woods are 'pie in the sky." "He believes that ten-year-olds can't get a good grip on assembly language in an environment "not conducive to concentration."

An interesting middleof-the-road approach is available at places such as the Arizona Computer Camp, where the children work directly with computers part of the time and, during their outdoor activities, gather environmental data they use while learning to program.

I'll stay out of this controversy and simply point out that the academic style of computer camp is available if you want it. What to Look for in a Camp Hidden costs. In the chart that accompanies this article, I've tried to list the complete cost for each session at a camp, including any diskettes, lodging, food, or field trips. Some camps charge extra for diskettes that children can take away at the end of camp, for instance, or for commemorative camp T-shirts. Find out how much everything costs, not just the instruction.

Types of computers and the ratio of computers to campers. The chart lists only camps that use Apple equipment, of course. Some camps deliberately utilize a mixture of equipment, so that campers won't be tied to one brand of computer. Other camps deplore that tactic and say it doesn't provide in-depth learning. Decide for yourself, based on what you learn about the curriculum.

The teamwork children develop when they work together increases what they learn.

Most camps aim for two students per computer. They reason that although a one-on-one relationship with a He is alluring, the teamwork children develop when they work together actually increases what they learn, since the kids



can ask each other questions, rather than depend on the teacher alone. Having a computer for every camper isn't a detriment, either, and each child may get more hands-on time.

Computer staff. Who does the real teaching? Is it certified teachers with computer-education experience, teachers who underwent

computer training before the camp started, or graduate students in computer science? Jacqueline Massing, camp director at Silicon Valley Computer Camp, argues in favor of computer-science graduates and undergraduates as instructors, saying they're easier for children to identify with and are also "much more up to date and aware of games and computer languages." (Silicon Valley

Be sure to include your child's level of interest in your calculations.

Computer Camp also uses certified teachers, however.) Many camps pride themselves on using only certified teachers steeped in computer instruction; almost every camp employs less-experienced teachers' aides to lighten the work load, though.

Computer curriculum. Here's the heart of the issue. A one-to-one camper/computer ratio is meaningless if the instructional materials are vapid and weak.

Question camp directors most closely on this point, and don't forget to include your child's level of interest in your calculations: after all, intensive computer instruction eight hours a day will only bore or disgust a child with moderate curiosity in the subject.

Find out how the material is taught. Some camps rely on the instructor to transmit every drop of knowledge; others use self-programmed workbooks and a lot of solo time. Here the literature is thick with buzz-words such as "indi-

vidualized instruction," which means either low teacher/student ratios or lots of workbook time, depending on who's talking. Ask to be sure.

Valerie Abad, director of Data Base Camp, bemoans the rise of "canned" curricula in computer education. "What are they doing for three hours? Do the kids just play with software, or do they get individualized training?" Abad says her camp deliberately chose to limit its sessions to 30 or fewer students, so its teachers wouldn't be tempted to just point students at a workbook.

Workbooks aren't necessarily bad; some children indeed work better on their own with minimal instruction or interference. Here again you must take your own child's needs into account.

As for subjects offered, almost every camp offers the BASIC and Logo languages, and most offer Pascal. Game writing is a common way to capture children's interest while luring them into programming their own games. This year the hot topic is robotics. One camp, the Computer Day Camp at the Pacific Science Center in Seattle, is de-

veloping its own tabletop robot and therefore gives all students their own robot for experimentation and play.

Some camps approach computers through specialized one-subject labs. Others make no bones about their emphasis on teaching Jane and Junior to program, believing that children don't really get a crack at serious programming in most school computer-education classes.

Send Your Daughters

The ratio of girls to boys in computer camps is usually only one to three, and most camp directors think that's a shame. "It's extremely important that parents expose their daughters to do this," says Massing. "Women are awfully good programmers. If opportunities are really equal, if women are encouraged, then they'll succeed." Abad says the best time to start girls in computers and math is between the ages of 10 and 12, to get a jump on the math fear that appears between 12 and 14, when girls start worrying about being attractive to boys. Often parents don't encourage it, she says, "because they figure girls don't need it." Your child's life won't be blighted without computers, of course, but if you don't send your daughter to camp because she's not your son, you're doing her a real disservice.

Don't neglect yourself either. Some camps, such as CompuSkil's Compu-Trails camp or the Computer Camp for

Youth in Utah, offer sessions for families. These types of camps introduce all members of the family to computing, usually the entertainment and book-keeping facets. If you want to get away on your own without the kids, you might try a Club Med vacation (Club Med offers computer instruction along with its other enticements) or Computer Camps International in Vernon, Connecticut.

How to Find Out More

Because computer camps were so trendy during the last couple of years, several guides to computer camps were published in 1984. This year the flood







PRICE-EARNINGS
AND PRICE-SALES RATIOS

Everybody wants to pick a winner and stay away from the losers. Consider the story about the legendary Pat Bolonga. Pat who?

In 1929, at the height of the stockmarket craze, Joseph P. Kennedy stopped at a bootblack stand located at 70 Pine Street, an office building near Wall Street. One of the bootblacks was (and still is) Pat Bolonga. Pat and Joe probably talked about a lot of thingsbaseball and politics perhaps—but the one subject they discussed that later changed both of their lives was the stock market. Joe Kennedy reasoned that if a bootblack was actively playing the market, then things had gone too far and that sooner or later the roof would cave in. Just days before the crash, Kennedy sold his stock. For the price of a shine he had saved millions. Pat lost \$8000.

History has shown us that the investment philosophies of both Kennedy and Bolonga were based on the emotion of the moment, rather than on the worthiness of their investments.

Today, 46 years later, a lot has changed, but the object of the markets is still to make money. Everybody has an opinion and a technique for choosing the winners and avoiding the losers. This month, we are going to look at two techniques: one that's been around for many years, the price-earnings ratio, and a brand new technique, the price-sales ratio.

Quite simply, ratios are a quick and easy way to describe a stock in relation to something else—be it another investment, the market, or the stock itself.

Price-Earnings Ratio

To calculate this ratio, divide the market price of the stock by the earnings per share for the last twelve months. For example, if Whackco, a



supplier of straitjackets, had a stock price of \$10 per share and earnings of \$1 per share, its P/E ratio would be 10.

What does a P/E of 10 mean? By itself, nothing, but compared against the

P/E of stocks in the same industry, or the market in general, it means a great deal.

Comparing the P/E of stocks in the same industry, or against the market as a whole, quickly shows us which stocks the market favors. The higher the P/E, the higher the market's valuation of the company, and thus its stock. Be careful, though—a high P/E that has no other

justification but the romance of the company could signal danger.


On the other hand, a low P/E can indicate a mature industry or company, one in which the prospects for growth are not good.

P/E ratios are typically used to find investments and then to track their relative performance against other stocks in the same industry—and against the market as a whole. Historically, the "average" P/E has been 10, but as the economy—and the industry itself—changes (whoever heard of a steel company that sells gasoline), P/E ratios will probably change, too.

Price/sales (P/S) ratios help you identify stocks you shouldn't invest in. To calculate them, you divide a company's sales during the past twelve months by the number of shares outstanding and then divide the result into the market price of the company's stock.

The resulting P/S ratio gives you an excellent indication of the strength of each dollar of market price.

Many companies do not have stable earnings, and many high-growth firms have low earnings or none at all. These conditions do not make stock in such companies an unworthy investment, but we do have to measure such companies with a different yardstick than the traditional (P/E) ones. For these companies, the P/S ratio is superior to the P/E ratio for measuring the market's valuation.

In theory, the lower the P/S ratio, the more opportunities there are for price appreciation. The higher the P/S,

the higher "accounting" the market has taken of the stock.

Remember, use P/E ratios to gauge a stock and P/S ratios to avoid a stock. Good "hurdles" by which to evaluate price/sales ratios come from Kenneth L. Fischer, a widely known proponent of P/S ratios, who is the head of Fischer Investments in Burlingame, California, and author of Super Stocks.

Fischer's guidelines for evaluating whether a stock's P/S is too high are as follows: More than 3 is too high for a small growth-oriented or high-tech company, more than .8 is too high for multibillion-dollar concerns, and more than .12 is too high for companies with low margins.

As we learned earlier, the P/S ratio highlights stocks we should avoid. When we find one without a negative P/S indication, however, the next step is to make a thorough, complete, and fundamental financial analysis of the company.

Why? Because a company can have a "good" P/S, but its balance sheet can be a mine field. Even experts such as Fischer have been mistaken about companies with cancerous debt, but a good P/S, on their balance sheets.

Spreadsheet Calculation

With a spreadsheet, P/E and P/S ratio analysis is fast. So fast, in fact, that you will probably want to try it on every investment you consider. Figure 1 is a P/S and P/E ratio worksheet that you can build in about five minutes. Let's take a look at it.

company name, the last closing price of the company's stock, earnings during the last twelve months, sales, and the number of shares outstanding. You can retrieve this information from the Dow Jones News/Retrieval service, published financial statements, stock-reporting services (e.g., Value Line), or your broker.

Using this information, the spreadsheet then calculates the P/S and P/E ratios from these two simple formulas.

110:(F2) + C10/(E10/F10)K10:(F2)+C10/(D10/F10)

To calculate the P/S ratio, first calculate the sales (E10) divided by shares (F10); then divide that figure into the closing price of the company's stock (C10).

P/E is just as easy. The spreadsheet simply divides the closing price of the company's stock (C10) by the earnings per share, which you in turn calculate by dividing the earnings (D10) by the number of shares outstanding (F10). These formulas are replicated for all stocks (rows 11-15) in our example.

You Can't Go Wrong

That's it. If you use a combination of

P/E and P/S ratios, you can't go amiss. Compare each stock's P/S to that of its competitors and to Fischer's guidelines. Track them over time, and you will get a feel for what's right and what's wrong. The same goes for P/E ratios, except that you will find industry averages in many stock reports or newslet-

P/E ratios tell you what the market thinks of a stock, and P/S ratios tell you what you should think of it.



n last month's cover story, Steve Rosenthal and Ken Kashmarek presented an overview of the newest operating system for the Apple II family, ProDOS. In this and three future articles, we'll take a closer look at ProDOS, the Applesoft disk commands and assembly-language subroutines that are used with it, and the underlying software drivers it uses to communicate with input/output (I/O) devices such as disks

and clocks. I'll also describe for you how to use two utility programs called Filer and Convert that perform various file-handling chores (such as copying files, formatting disks, exchanging files with DOS 3.3 disks, and so on).

This month, we'll concentrate on the most commonly used Applesoft disk commands, the ones that all Apple II users, not just programmers, should learn how to handle. Before we begin, however, let's review two concepts that you have to understand clearly before you can hope to master ProDOS: directories and pathnames.

A ProDOS disk is identified a volume and is identified by a name you assign to it when you first format it. (You can use the ProDOS FILER program for formatting). A newly formatted disk contains one directory, called the volume directory, that holds information concerning a maximum of 51 files. These files can be standard program or data files or files that define other directories (called subdirectories). These subdirectories can also hold either standard files or subdirectory files.

We need to know two things in order to identify any file uniquely on a disk: the name of the file itself and the name of the directory in which it resides. ProDOS receives this information as a unique identifier called a pathname,

which comprises the names of each of the directories that ProDOS must traverse to reach the file in question. The first name in the path is always that of the volume directory and must begin with a slash (/). All other names in the path are separated from the previous name by another slash.

For example, I'm writing this article with a copy of AppleWorks on a disk that has a volume directory called

ly when you boot a disk. (Actually, the first file in the volume directory whose name ends in .SYSTEM is the one that runs. If you are using a disk that contains Applesoft programs, though, BASIC.SYSTEM will undoubtedly be the first such file.) BASIC.SYSTEM extends the Applesoft command set by installing a group of 32 disk commands that any Applesoft program can use. This month, we will be looking at 19 of these com-

mands (see figure 1).

o use an Applesoft disk command from within a program, you must use the Applesoft PRINT statement to print a Control-D character (which signals a coming disk command), the name of the disk command, the command parameters, and then a carriage return. For example, to list all the files in a volume called /UTILI-TIES, you type (as one line) a program line that looks something like this:

100 PRINT CHR\$(4);
"CAT/UTILITIES"

In this example, the CHR\$(4) statement generates the Control-D character, the disk command is

CAT, and the command parameter is / UTILITIES (a pathname). The PRINT statement automatically generates the required carriage return.

If you're entering an Applesoft disk command directly from the keyboard in the Applesoft Command mode (that's the mode where you see the] prompt symbol), you don't have to worry about the Control-D. All you have to do is type the name of the command, followed by the command arguments, and then press Return. The keyboard equivalent of the CAT command is simply

CAT/UTILITIES [Return]

You should be aware, however, that BA-SIC.SYSTEM does not permit entry of

he rules for naming directories and files are the same. A name must be fewer than 16 characters long and must begin with a letter of the alphabet. The other characters in the name can either be letters, digits, or periods. Note that, unlike in DOS 3.3, filenames cannot contain spaces, special symbols, or control characters.

The Applesoft disk commands used with ProDOS are defined in a file called BASIC.SYSTEM that runs automatical-



all its commands from the keyboard this way. You can enter all the examples in this article while you're in the Applesoft command mode, though.

As you can see from figure 1, most of the Applesoft disk commands support, or require, several parameters that specify such information as the pathname of files to be acted on, loading addresses, lengths, and so on. A brief description of each of the parameters appears in figure 2.

ou can specify letter parameters in figure 2 (such as ,A#—where # represents the value of the parameter) in any order by appending them to the end of the command line. On the other hand, a pathname or "snum" parameter must come immediately after the command name. (The only exception is the Rename command, which requires two pathnames; the second pathname must appear immediately after the first.)

How to Enter Disk Commands

You can enter most Applesoft disk commands with the slot (,S#) and drive (,D#) parameters that specify the physical location of the disk to be accessed. You don't have to use these parameters if you know the pathname of the file in question, because Pro-DOS will automatically search all installed disk drives for the file. If you can specify a simple filename, however, to which no prefix has yet been attached (we'll discuss prefixes a little later) or if you use either the ,S# or ,D# parameter, the name of the volume directory specified by the slot and drive parameters (or their defaults) automatically creates the pathname.

This ability to use slot and drive parameters allows Applesoft programs to

maintain greater compatibility with DOS 3.3, in which you have to specify the slot and drive parameters to access disks in the nondefault drive.

Let's take a look at some of the more-common Applesoft disk commands.

CAT and CATALOG

Both these commands display a list of the names of the files on a disk. Only the names of the files in the directory specified in the pathname following the command will be in the list. (If no

such pathname is specified, then the list will be of the currently active directory.) CAT also displays the type of each file as a three-character mnemonic such as BAS (BASIC program), BIN (binary file), TXT (textfile), SYS (system program), DIR (directory file), and so on; the number of disk blocks the file occupies (each block is 512 bytes in size); and the date on which the file was last modified.

The CATALOG command displays the same information that CAT does, as well as the time of last modification of a file, its creation date and time, its size (in bytes), and its "subtype" entry. The subtype entry is the default loading address for a BIN file and the record length for a TXT file.

After you've listed all the files in the directory with either the CAT or the CATALOG command, the number of blocks free and blocks used on the disk are displayed. CATALOG also displays the size of the disk, in blocks. **PREFIX**

This command lets you define the chain of directory names to which any specified filename will automatically be appended to create the full path-

name that ProDOS requires. Setting the prefix to a particular directory path allows you to specify files in that directory by filename only, instead of by full pathname.

subdirectory file called EUROPE (its file-type mnemonic would be DIR). If you want to access a file in the EUROPE subdirectory by just specifying a simple filename and not the entire /GEOGRAPHY/EUROPE/FILENAME pathname, enter the command PRE-FIX/GEOGRAPHY/EUROPE as the pre-fix.

number (see text). For this reason, this parameter is usually referred to as the ,Ttype parameter,

specifying the name of the next-lower-level subdirectory (without a preceding slash). For example, if /GEOGRA-PHY/EUROPE contains a subdirectory called FRANCE, you can set the prefix to /GEOGRAPHY/EUROPE/FRANCE by entering PREFIX FRANCE (assuming, of course, that the preexisting prefix is still /GEOGRAPHY/EUROPE).

where type = BAS, BIN, TXT, SYS, DIR, and so on.

If you want to know the current setting of the prefix, simply enter the PRE-FIX command without any parameters, and the prefix will appear. (Note: If you do this inside an Applesoft program, the prefix string will be set equal to the string variable in the next INPUT statement. That is, after

100 PRINT CHR\$ (4): "PREFIX": INPUT A\$

is executed, A\$ will contain the prefix.)
Whenever you remove a disk from a

drive and insert another one, you should set the prefix to the volume-directory name of the new disk. The easiest method is to enter a command such as PRE-FIX,S6,D1 (for a slot-6, drive-1 disk). If you don't take this step, you will see a PATH NOT FOUND error message if you use CAT or CATALOG on the new disk without specifying its volume-directory name.

CREATE

You use this command to create a directory entry for a specified file. Its most common use is to create subdirectory files, since the other common types of ProDOS files (Applesoft programs, binary files, and text files) are automatically created by other Applesoft disk commands (SAVE, BSAVE, and OPEN).

For example, if you want to create a subdirectory that is called DEMO-PROGRAMS within the current di-

rectory, you enter the command CREATE DEMO.PROGRAMS at the keyboard. As a result, a subdirectory file (marked by a DIR mnemonic) appears in the current directory. You can also create other types of fields by using the ,Ttype parameter (where type is the three-character mnemonic for the file type).

LOAD, SAVE, and RUN

These three commands act only on Applesoft program files (the CATA-LOG mnemonic for such files is BAS). The LOAD command moves such programs from disk to memory, where you can list, edit, or run them. The SAVE command achieves the opposite result. This command transfers the Applesoft program in memory to a disk file. The RUN command is the same as the LOAD command, except that after you load the program, it runs automatically.

The ProDOS version of the RUN command is different from the DOS 3.3 version in one respect. You can use ,@# to specify the line number in the Applesoft program that is to run first (if you don't specify otherwise, the program always starts running at the lowest line number). For example, the command

RUN/GAMES/MOUSE.TRAP, 0500

would run a program called MOUSE-.TRAP (in the GAMES directory), beginning at line 500.

BLOAD

This command lets you transfer data from a file to an area of memory. The most common form of the BLOAD command is

BLOAD MY. FILE, A #

where # represents the address of the beginning of the block to which the file is to be transferred.

The default file type is binary (BIN), but you can override the default by using the ,Ttype parameter. You can also use the BLOAD command without the ,A# parameter; in this case, the file will be loaded at the location at which you originally saved it to disk with the BSAVE command (this address appears in the Subtype

The easiest way to create an EXEC file is to use a word processor or line editor that stores its

> documents as standard ProDOS

text files.

column when you catalog the disk with the CATALOG command).

You can load any portion of a file by using one or more optional parameters: ,B# (the starting position within the file), ,L# (the number of bytes to be transferred), and/or ,E# (the last memory location of the transfer).

BRUN

This command is the same as the BLOAD command, except that after you load the file, it runs automatically, beginning at the loading address. You can use the BRUN command only with binary (BIN) files.

BSAVE

BSAVE allows you to save the contents of a range of memory to a file. (The default file type is binary [BIN], but you can override this default with the ,Ttype parameter.) For example, in order to save the contents of memory locations \$300-\$3CF to a binary

file called PAGE.THREE, you enter the command

BSAVE PAGE. THREE, A\$300, E\$3CF

ending address, and ,L\$D0 shows the number of bytes to be saved. You can also use ,B# to specify the byte position in the file at which the writing will begin. Note that the DOS 3.3 version of BSAVE did not have the ,E# or the ,B# parameters.

EXEC

This command redirects requests for input, which normally comes from the keyboard, to a specified text file instead, until the computer has read everything in the text file. Suppose you have a text file called MY.STARTUP, for example, that contains the following three lines:

HOME PREFIX, S6, D1 RUN MY. PROGRAM

Enter EXEC MY.STARTUP from the Applesoft Command mode, and the screen will clear; the prefix will be set equal to the name of the volume directory on the slot-6, drive-1 disk; and the MY.PROGRAM program (in the volume directory) will be loaded and executed, just as if you had entered all three commands directly from the keyboard. If you don't want to use EXEC on an entire file, you can use, F# or, R# to specify the number of the first line in the file to be used.

The easiest way to create an EXEC file is to use a word processor or line editor that stores its documents as standard ProDOS text files. For example, you can use the AppleWorks word processor to compose a file and then save it to disk by pressing open-Apple P and indicating that you want to print the file to a text (ASCII) file on disk.

- (Dash)

This "intelligent run" command has no DOS 3.3 equivalent. Its pathname can describe an Applesoft program, a binary program, or a text file, in which cases - will behave exactly like a RUN, BRUN, or EXEC command, respectively. You can also use the dash to load and run ProDOS system programs such as BASIC.SYS-TEM. (System programs' CATALOG mnemonic is SYS.).

LOCK and UNLOCK

These two commands let you modi-

fy the write-protect status of a file. Once you've locked a file with the LOCK command, you cannot delete, modify, or rename it unless you unlock it first with the UNLOCK command. You can easily identify the status of a file by using CAT or CATALOG to display the names of the files on the disk. If an asterisk precedes the name of the file, it is locked.

DELETE

You use this command to remove the entry for a file from the disk directory and to free up the disk blocks that

the file is using. The DELETE command works only on unlocked files.

RENAME

This command lets you change the name of any file on a disk from the first specified filename to the second. For example, if the current name of the file is SUPERMAN and you want to change it to SUPERWOMAN, you enter the command RENAME SUPERMAN, SUPERWOMAN to effect the change.

IN# and PR#

These commands redirect requests for input (IN#) or output (PR#) to a peripheral card in an expansion slot (the slot number is specified by the snum parameter) or to the address of any input/output (I/O) subroutine in memory. For example, to redirect output to a printer in slot 1, use the command PR#1, and to accept input from a subroutine located at hexadecimal \$300, use the IN#A\$300 command.

Another form of the IN# and PR# commands can enable you to redefine the meaning of an IN# or PR# command that is used with a slot-number parameter. If you enter the command PR#1,A\$300 or something similar, then whenever you subsequently enter a PR#1 command, output goes to location hexadecimal \$300 instead of to slot 1.

VERIFY

The VERIFY command really has only one useful purpose—to determine whether a particular file or directory exists on a disk. (In DOS 3.3 you use it to check whether any part of the file has been lost because of damage to the disk.) For example, if the current prefix is /A.PLUS and you want to see if the pathname /A.PLUS/PART.TWO exists, enter a VERIFY PART.TWO command. If the pathname does, indeed, exist, no error message will appear. If it doesn't, you will see a PATH NOT FOUND error message.

Well, that ends this month's discourse on the first group of Applesoft disk commands. Next month we'll continue by introducing you to the remaining disk commands, those that are most useful for programmers.





TELECOMMUNICATIONS BY RUSS LOCKWOOD

Research and leisure with telecommunications

DATABASES AND DIALOGUES

Telecommunications represents a growing industry. Modem prices are down, modem sales are up, and new services are being introduced every year. Corporations, schools, and individuals are discovering the convenience of telecommunications.


This month, we look at two new services—Wilsonline, a collection of databases used worldwide by libraries, corporations, and government agencies; and American People Link, an electronic-mail and entertainment service for the home. We also include telecommunications news of interest and then end with a letter from a reader who properly chastises me and proposes a worthwhile project.

WILSONLINE

Many venerable publishing companies are offering electronic editions of their printed work. The latest entry is Wilsonline from the H.W. Wilson Company, a firm that traces its reference roots back to 1898. You may not recognize the company name, but anyone who has researched a term paper knows all about its primary product, The Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature.

Wilsonline consists of 14 databases, 10 of which are on-line versions of Wilson's printed indexes—Applied Science and Technology Index, Biological and Agricultural Index, Book Review Digest, Business Periodicals Index, Cumulative Book Index, Education Index, Humanities Index, Index to Legal Periodicals, Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature, and Social Sciences Index. Four other databases—Library of Congress/MARC File, Journal Directory, Publisher's Directory, and Name Authority file—are available only on-line.

Wilsonline updates the databases twice per week, with citations to articles appearing on-line generally within ten



days of publication. All databases include at least one and a half years of citations, and most go back even further. The Library of Congress/MARC file stretches back seven years.

Wilsonline plans to add more databases during 1985, including Art Index

(October), Bibliographic Index (November), Biography (July), General Science Index (May), and Library Literature (October). Currently, Wilsonline houses information on more than 3000 periodicals and 500,000 books.

How to Use Wilsonline

You can search the databases individually or search up to eight databases at the same time. For veteran research-

ers, the commands are fairly standard. For newcomers, the commands prove easy to master. Wilsonline comes with a 105-page tutorial book to help you get started. An extensive manual, *Wilsonline Guide and Documentation*, which describes search procedures and databases in detail, costs an extra \$30.

Wilsonline uses the free-text and controlled-vocabulary methods for searching databases. Free text means that you can find citations by entering any string of characters. The system checks your characters against those on file and provides all the matches.

Controlled vocabulary means you enter specific terms defined by the company. The system returns all citations logged under those terms. For example, to locate information on Winchester hard-disk drives, you can enter Winchester, using free-text searching, or Memory Devices (Computers), using controlled-vocabulary searching.

Wilson extends the flexibility of its searching methods by including the

Boolean operators AND, OR, and NOT; the ability to truncate free-text search words; and scanning through a particular date range. These features allow you to narrow your search—saving time, effort, and money.

The citations provide a variety of information, the most important being where to look for information on a particular topic. Do not get me wrong, the printed versions are extremely helpful, but one search using Wilsonline may just convert you to telecommunications for life.

Price

H.W. Wilson Company maintains a fairly involved pricing schedule, with discounts for prepaid Wilsonline subscriptions and for subscribers of the printed indexes. Nonsubscribers to Wilsonline or the printed indexes pay \$45-\$65 per connect hour (depending on database), plus \$8 per hour for telecommunications charges (access via Tymnet or Telenet). Off-line prints cost 20 cents per citation with a \$10 minimum. A one-day training seminar is \$60 per person.



AMERICAN PEOPLE LINK

American People Link aspires to become another full-featured home service like CompuServe, The Source, and Delphi. Obviously, it faces an uphill battle against these firmly entrenched services. Still, the telecommunications industry is so dynamic that a newcomer can carve out its own niche and grow if it offers the right mix of features, responsiveness, and price.

With these criteria in mind, I can easily get excited about American People Link. Although currently a bit short on features, it lets you know right from the start that it wants subscribers' input. One phrase in the manual caught my eye: "You are a valued customer and we will always treat you as such." If the company follows through with that resolution, we predict a long and happy life for American People Link.

Promises aside, American People Link currently offers two main services: electronic mail and Partyline. Electronic mail allows you to trade messages

with other subscribers. Partyline, like CB Simulator on CompuServe or Chat on The Source, lets you talk live to other subscribers.

With Partyline, you can hold a private conversation with select people by using a code word. Also, you can use a Muffle and Hush command so that an obnoxious partner can neither see your typed lines nor send you typed lines. This handy feature certainly cleans up the party.

The service is easy to use and offers a choice of menus and commands. Newcomers should become fluent with the commands within a short time. Every command is preceded with a slash (/), such as /HELP, /HUSH, or /OFF, and you can toggle the menu back on, should you forget a particular command.

American People Link offers an online newspaper with features, advice column, editorial, and letters to the editor; a subscriber directory so you can find other people with similar interests; and a printed newsletter called Letterlink. New features in the works include a bulletin-board service, special-interest clubs, on-line interviews with celebrities, and simple two-player games



Price

And what is the cost for this service? A one-time initial subscription fee of \$14.95, and just \$2.95 per hour on weekends and from 6:01 P.M. to 7 A.M. weekdays, for 300 baud. That is roughly half the price of CompuServe and Delphi and less than half the price of The Source. This price increases to \$8.95 for 1200 baud. Prime-time service from 7:01 A.M. to 6 P.M. weekdays, for both 300 baud and 1200 baud, costs \$8.95; again, about half the cost. Access is via Telenet, and Canadian subscribers who use the Datapac system pay a \$5-per-hour surcharge.

TELETIPS

This section provides news related to the telecommunications world and offers a quick overview of new features added to services already reviewed. The information comes from culling the numerous press releases that streak across my desk each day.

Nuke 'Em 'Til They Glow

AEC to the Rescue

The Association of Electronic Cottagers offers marketing support, business and professional services, on-line consultations, and databases for "computer entrepreneurs and telecommuters

who work at home on salary." Founders Paul and Sarah Edwards, who operate the Work-At-Home Special Interest Group on CompuServe, have drafted an Electronic Cottage Bill of Rights with eight provisions.

Provision 1, for example, states: "Legislatures shall make no laws prohibiting freedom of opportunity to work in one's home with a computing and/or robotic device when that work does not interfere with neighbors' enjoyment of their own homes and communities." For immediate information, contact CompuServe PPN 76703,242.

CompuServe Additions

Sports enthusiasts can now access TeleSports, a sports-information service featuring news about collegiate and professional athletics, including point spreads, injuries, statistics, team analysis, and scores.

CompuServe now distributes USA Today Update, Gannett's electronic information service, which provides general news, business news, weather, international news, and special reports on specific industries and professions.

The Source Updates

The Source adds up-to-the-hour commodities prices, news, and commentary with Commodity World News. The new service offers hourly price updates for 57 commodities, approximately 200 news items per day, and general industry insight updated three times per day.

The Source also offers A-Z, a comprehensive database, listing information about 14,000 domestic and 8000 international hotels. A-Z is updated monthly.

The only way you can protect your home base is to shoot them

down or blow them up. Not a lot of room for skilled diplomacy here, right?

To the credit of its designer, Ray Tobey, however, Skyfox is a very sophisticated shoot-'em-up. A computer shows you the enemy's positions on a large world grid, and an automatic pilot takes you to the nearest enemy infestation. Your arsenal of equipment includes a running radar display; heat-seeking guided missiles; and clock, fuel, speed, shield, and altitude indicators. There are more things to look at on your control panel than Han Solo has in his hobby room-not to mention the view outside the window!

The Action

Skyfox is not quite a flight simulator, but it's close. You launch like something out of "Battlestar Galactica." Once you are out of the launch tunnel. the horizon tilts and wheels. dips and rises, as you move the joystick right and left, forward and back. Below vou, tanks approach; above you, planes are visible. Pressing button 0 fires bullets-or blips, or what-

ever-and the planes and tanks blow up. Pressing button 1 releases a heat-seeking guided missile.

After you've destroyed all the planes and tanks you can find, you get to go after the mothership, which is big, very big. It's also extremely hard to destroy. I never could get close enough to blow one up, but it must be possible.

Skyfox doesn't require a lot of strategy, but it does provide a lot of action. It's probably best for boys under the age of 13. I could get involved in it only by pretending that the tanks were bill collectors and the planes were lawyers. Now that was exciting!

A KAMIKAZE VERSION OF CHESS

I have high praise for Archon, a game that puts you into complex battles requiring arcade skills, as well as strategic thinking—but more of the former than of the latter.

Archon comes from Electronic Arts and was written by Anne Westfall, Jon Freeman, and Paul Reiche III. It is a kind of kamikaze version of chess, using magic, hand-to-hand combat, and a quicksand playing board. The square your piece is standing on changes colors regularly, thereby affecting the strength of your character.

The tactical board of the game is laid out like a chessboard, but unlike in chess, you don't have pawns or rooks in Archon. You have Valkyries, golems, unicorns, djinni, wizards, phoenix, knights, and archers on one side—and, on the other,



banshees, trolls, basilisks, shapeshifters, sorcerers, dragons, manticores, and goblins. All of these creatures have different strengths and abilities. None of them have very nice personalities, so conflicts between them tend to be . . . ah, violent-and usually short.

In addition to all of the above, Archon includes magic spells. The manual, which reads like a module from Dungeons and Drag-



ons, describes teleportation spells, healing spells, timeshifting spells, resurrection spells, imprisonment spells, and even a spell that summons elemental demons.

The Battles

When two pieces land on. the same square, they fight it out; the game switches to an arena screen and the battle begins instantly. The joystick moves the character, and the button fires its weapon. The battles bring out each character's abilities. Creatures with a lot of strength and endurance are much more likely to win a fight than creatures with little of either. Naturally, the survivor wins the square.

I found the battle part of the game to be the trickiest. Some characters "reload" quicker than others, and some can't seem to fire their



weapons in certain directions. Some characters just feel easier to use. I spent the better part of a day just fighting battles so I could find out what each character could do in combat. At the end of the time, I still wasn't totally certain.

Complex and Challenging

Be prepared to spend a lot of time just learning all the possibilities in the game before you actually start to play. Possibly the game's only flaw is the amount of work it takes to learn it. On the other hand, the game is complex enough to present a challenge to even the most dedicated gamester.

For the average person, though, Archon may present too many possibilities. The appeal of chess, for instance, lies in the great wealth of possibilities that exist in the different relationships of the pieces on the board. Perhaps Archon best suits those people who are impatient with the subtleties and demands of chess and who prefer a game that plays more like a free-forall than like a deliberate

contest of strategy.

One or two people can play, and it helps if they don't like each other very much. If they do, they probably won't by the time the game is over. Be prepared to get involved in the fates of your characters because they tend to take on lives of their own. You won't like seeing them killed off, and you won't like the person who does it. I expect Archon to break up many wonderful friendships.



THE JOYS OF SLOW BALL

Unlike the frenetic excitement of football and basketball, baseball is appealing because it's out of pace with the modern world. It's a casual game with infrequent thrills that punctuate long, lazy summer afternoons.

You can sit in the stands, drink a beer, talk statistics, argue about the designated-hitter rule, compare the '74 A's with the '34 Cardinals, and try to figure out the opposing team's signs—all while waiting for a single pitch.

Unfortunately, that unique pacing—the thing that's most appealing about baseball—is the hardest thing to capture when creating a computerized version of the game.

Most computer baseball

games don't even try. Instead, they simplify the sport and speed up the action—ignoring strikes and balls, allowing only two or three different types of pitches, even cutting the game down to three innings.


But Star League Baseball from Gamestar is as slow and relaxed as the real thing. It's hardly the perfect computerized version of the game, but, for a fanatic, it's a satisfactory substitute.

A Few Caveats

Realistically, Star League Baseball requires a color display. Playing it on a monochrome monitor is like watching a postseason playoff game in snowy Toronto.

It requires a joystick. I tried playing it with regular game paddles, but my infielders kept wandering out to the right-field fences, apparently demanding that they be given a less-challenging position on the field.

To top it all off, the Star League Baseball manual was written for Atari users. Apple owners must refer to the addendum to translate Atari commands into Apple commands.



Maybe I've just had too many softballs bounce off my head, but I really had trouble figuring out what to push when, especially when I first started. Add that to the fact that the people at Gamestar say the Atari display is a bit sharper, and you'll probably reach the same conclusion I did: If you have access to an Atari home computer, this instance may be the one time you'd prefer to buy a program for it instead of for your Apple.

The Game

Visually, Star League Baseball is quite agreeable, complete with stands, scoreboard, lush green field, and players that are as detailed as you could reasonably hope for. (A Macintosh version of the game is promised that will, of course, sacrifice color but add a fine level of detail to the players.)

As you play, you hear the crack of the bat, watch the shadow of the ball move

As a bang-the-ball, whiff-the-batter type of game, Star League Baseball stands up well to anything else. You can choose between two pitchers to start the game, each with an eight-pitch repertoire. and even bring in a lateinning knuckleballer to handle relief. The action is demanding, but lifelike, requiring you quickly to switch gears between pitching, fielding, and picking off opponents.

When you're batting, you can bunt, hit away (as in real baseball, when you hit affects where you hit), or take pitches that look high or outside.

Low on Strategy

As a strategy game,

though, Star League Baseball falls short. Although the package promises that you can "choose your own starting team," all you really get to decide is whether your team is to be made up of sluggers or line-ball hitters. From that point, however, there's no subtlety to the selection. You don't, for instance, set a lineup that puts a power hitter in the number 4 position, or a weak hitter in the number 9 spot. Thus, you don't get to make the kinds of decisions that a manager makes. Every hitter is the same, and, when you're playing, you're just one of the gang. A Game for Baseball Fans

Star League Baseball is designed for one-player play against the computer (a pretty tough opponent) or two-player play. You can practice your batting in a

nongame situation, but not your fielding—a problem, since playing the field in Star League Baseball is actually pretty complicated. In fact, I lost a few 40-0 games to the computer before I figured out exactly what to do.

All in all, it's safe to say that Star League Baseball won't take over for the real thing, but it does take just about as much time and can give the rabid fan something more to rave about.





Modern World War II

The game's description sounds odd: the idea is that it's World War II fought with modern technology—tanks, helicopters, smart missiles, and so on. You see, these terrorists have got hold of a time machine—never mind, you don't need to know the details. Just make sure you have enough helicopters and tanks.

Helicopters are especial-

ly important, because when you run out of them, the game is over. A long bar



across the top of the screen represents the battlefield and shows you where everything is and what's going on at all times. The main screen shows you what's going on in the vicinity of your chopper.

The east end of the battlefield is your base; the west end is the enemy base. You need a two-button joystick so you can fire machine guns, drop bombs, and release smart airborne missiles. 





No Simple Shoot-'em-up

Thus, even though Rescue Raiders looks like just another simple shoot-'emup, it's really a sophisticated game about managing resources. The strategy is to use your limited income to deploy your army most effectively.

Listen, I know you're impatient for me to write a review of Rescue Raiders, but I don't think it's fair to

write about a game when I've had such a limited amount of exposure to it. I think I should try to go all the way up to level 8 and make sure that my evaluation is fair. I think if I work at it every weekend and most of my evenings, I can probably be finished by Thanksgiving Day, and you could have the review in time for the Christmas issue of A+. How does that sound?





difficult to master and becomes trickier with each passing level. Mr. Robot and His Robot Factory is one of those games—exciting, frenetic, and addictive.

The game is a cross between Pac-Man and Donkey Kong. The object is to guide Mr. Robot around a factory and pick up power pills before his energy runs out. This factory is a real metallic jungle—treadmills, ladders, escalators, sliding poles, trampolines, bombs, magnets, and transporters. Worse, "alienfires"

'Alienfires' roam the floors trying to grab Mr. Robot.

roam the floors trying to grab and melt Mr. Robot. Only touching an energizer brings a temporary respite from the flames of the alienfires.

The graphics are colorful, if not overly spectacular. Mr. Robot and His Robot Factory emphasizes heart-pumping action, rather than fancy graphics. Still, you can easily distinguish between different objects, and the screen images are a cut above those of arcade games such as Lode Runner (see A+, May 1984, pages 129–131).

Challenging Action

The game holds 22 floors of challenging action. The eighth floor (level H), nicknamed the Trampoline Floor, presents the first apparently insurmountable obstacle. The solution is to bounce to the top of the screen, collect the power pills, and then jump off the right edge. If you time your leap correctly, you will touch the energizer and

bound down four trampolines, eliminating the alienfires on each one.

Then—and this is the real key to the screenjump to the right as if to jump off the screen. You will bounce off the screen border to the trampoline below. The rest is a simple matter of jumping and running, but do not forget to grab the bonus robot token in the middle of the screen. You will need every robot you can get to clear the more straightforward—and more difficult-9th floor (level I).

The game also includes a build-your-own factory module. You can create up to 26 of your own devious screens using any and all of the shapes, obstacles, and tricks contained in the preprogrammed game. Lode Runner had this feature and the result was a sequel, Championship Lode Runner (see A +, February 1985, pages 187-188), with 50 exceptionally tough screens. I think a Championship Mr. Robot is an equally good idea.

Be forewarned: Mr. Robot and His Robot Factory is addictive. It will keep you glued to your Apple for a long time. An exceptional blend of time-tested elements forms a truly challenging and exciting game. I highly recommend Mr. Robot and His Robot Factory.







THE LECTRONIC FILE FOLDER Choosing a database program

As recently as a few months ago, complaints were rife about the lack of software for the Macintosh. Now a plethora of programs are out there.

If a database manager is what you need, you can choose from the dozen or more programs that are now available, but you probably wonder how you will be able to pick the one that best meets your needs. For that matter, you may even wonder if you need one at all—that box of tattered index cards has worked all these years, right?

Should you be unfamiliar with the purposes and power of database programs, some general information may help you resolve the question of whether or not you need one. Once you have decided you need such a program, start your research. Find out what features are available and which programs have those features.

he charts that accompany this article (see pages 111 and 116) rate 13 Macintosh database programs in various performance areas. Use the information in the charts and the guidance the article provides to help determine your database needs and the program that meets them.

A database is a collection of infor-

mation—any kind of information, from names and addresses to the particulars of your customer accounts or even graphic images. A database manager, or file manager, is a program that lets you collect, organize, maintain, and manipulate your information. It also allows you to print various reports that are usually selective summaries of the information.

What are the advantages of an electronic database over any of its paper counterparts? You can store more information in less space, retrieve it more quickly, have calculations performed automatically, and easily vary the printed output.

The three most important terms in database management are file, record, and field. A file is a collection of records, much like a file box that holds index cards. A record is analogous to a single card in the file—a collection of related information, such as the name, address, and telephone number of one person. A field is a single piece of information, such as a name or a telephone number.

Beyond the basics of files, records, and fields, programs offer varying levels of manipulative ability: alphabetical and numeric sorting, the selection of groups of records with something in common, and so on.

When shopping for a databasemanagement system (DBMS), the first thing to do is ask yourself three important questions: How much information can the program handle? How many ways can that information be manipulated? How well does the program perform in the areas that are important to you?

To help narrow your list of prospective DBMSs, check your needs against the data in the Vital Statistics chart (see page 111).

o you need the extra power of a relational system? With a relational DBMS, you can link together the records of two separate files into a single temporary file. By assigning one customer the same customer-identification field, you can, for instance, tap into a customer name-and-address file while processing the orders stored in another file. You will not have to enter or store the name and address in the order file, which results in a considerable saving of both time and storage space if customers place multiple orders.

How much data do you need to store? With most DBMSs, the amount of room on the disk is the only limit on the size of your file. The number of records you can have in a file depends on the amount of information in each record. The number of characters that you can put in each field is important: if you want to enter syn-




Figure 1: ProVUE's OverVUE gives an almost overwhelming choice of "attributes" for field formats. The columnar arrangement of information allows you to see more than one record at a time and makes data entry very easy. This columnar setup is the only one available in OverVUE; some programs allow you to toggle between such an arrangement and a free-form record design.

opses of the books in your professional library, a 40-character limit will be very frustrating.

How do you want to organize your records? Some programs let you sort alphabetically or numerically on only one field at a time. A multilevel sort can arrange your records by ZIP code, also alphabetizing names within each ZIP area. A program with "infinite" sorting levels lets you sort on as many fields as a record contains.

Do you need to view more than one file at a time? Some programs allow multiple open files but do not let you transfer information easily.

Once you have a list of the database programs that can handle your overall filing needs, you can start thinking about the finer points.

he first thing to do when setting up a database is to design the records: name the fields, define their sizes, and determine their placement on the screen.

Methods of defining the field size vary, from typing in the number of characters to tracing an area of the screen, but you always have to plan ahead. (Well, not always—Microsoft File and OverVUE, for example, let you go ahead and type, and you can change the size of the fields later.)

A good database program lets you

easily change your database design as your needs change. The most important editing option is one that lets you add a new field even after you have started to enter information—because that's when you discover you need a new field.

Macintosh databases vary greatly in the amount of available numeric and text-formatting options. Formatting a field so that it holds only dollars, or integers, or a certain number of decimals, saves time when it comes to entering the information—you can enter a 5, and it will appear as \$5.00. Most programs allow no text formatting at all and restrict you to the system default font, both on the screen and on paper. If looks are important to you—and the Mac has spoiled us in that area—check on what a pro-

gram lets you print out.

The final consideration in the realm of record design is the overall design freedom the program provides. OverVUE, for example, has a rigid format reminiscent of a spreadsheet layout (see figure 1). Each record is on a single line, and changing column positions and widths is the extent of your alteration abilities. In contrast, Microsoft File allows very flexible formatting. You can drag fields and labels around, changing their vertical or horizontal dimensions at will (see figure 2).

Field Types

When you are designing the record format of a file, you can usually specify the type of field as well as its name and size. Most programs can at least differentiate between text and numeric fields. Since you cannot enter text into a defined numeric field, you can specify the type of field in order to avoid many data-entry mistakes. The major advantage of numeric fields, however, is that they can be sorted by their value.

The Picture Field

The Macintosh has made it possible to add a new type of field to database terminology: the picture (or graphics-image) field. Microsoft File is the only program I reviewed that offers such a feature. With the advent of reasonably priced digitizers and graphics-editing tools such as MacPaint and MacDraw, a picture field takes on new importance and versatility. How about a digitized picture of a stamp in your collection, an employee in your company, or a logo for your mailing labels?

Some programs require unique fields and some simply allow them. A unique field is one in which the entry must differ from those in all other re-

cords. If NAME were a unique field, you could not have two JASON KANTER entries. Unique fields can help keep records straight, but they also constrain your information storage. Ideally, a program should give you the option of naming a unique field and let you override it on com-

A versatile DBMS includes the ability to calculate fields that contain formulas referring to other fields in the record. In this way, for instance, you can have each record show the

weekly pay for an employee based on the number of hours worked and the individual pay rate.

Data Entry and Manipulation

Once you have designed your records, it's time to enter information into your file. Two features in particular speed this process: field replication and a global field option.

Field replication allows you to copy a field entry from the last record into the current one. A global field option is similar to field replication: The indicated field automatically fills with the same data in every record.

After you've entered the information, you'll probably want to sort it in order to organize the records. Besides the number of levels it can handle, other qualities of a sorting feature deserve consideration. A program that requires a predefined key makes you decide ahead of time which field is to be the "sortable" one; this rather rigid structure never lets you change your mind.

A program that lets you define one or more fields as an index field sorts more quickly when you choose to sort by those fields. And, if you can't do a reverse sort, you will never be able to list things from the highest priced, highest rated, or highest anything on down to the lowest.

Almost any program lets you select a particular group of records—everyone who owes over \$100, for example, or all records from New Jerseywhen it's time to print things out. A good feature to look for, though, is a Select option that lets you take a certain group of records and manipulate them further-in effect, this option gives you the ability to work with a

Whether you are using a Select option to get a group of records or a Search option to look for a single record at a time, the Macintosh databases vary greatly in the way they let you "ask" for records. Decide if you need to retrieve your data by simple search criteria—names that begin with A, for instance—or complex search criteria, such as customer accounts with outstanding (more than 90 days) amounts over \$500, who haven't made a partial payment this month.

Ithough a simple report can be just a columnar listing of the information in your file, it can also be much more than that. A report can let you do cross-record calculations, as opposed to calculating one field that works only within each record. Although a calculated field can give you the weekly pay for each employee, a report can give you the total of your weekly payroll.

You may need a program that can do more than simply add numbers. Some of the functions available in various programs include averaging,







counting the items entered, finding the minimum or maximum figures in the column, and even calculating standard deviation.

Almost as important as *what* can be printed in a report is *how* it can be printed. Can you print in different fonts, use boldface, define headers and footers? Can you print field labels? Can you number pages and have a new page start as each new category is printed?

A regular report lists all the records in a file, with subtotals or other calculations for the groups you have defined. A summary report, however, prints only the overall information, giving the title of the group and the results of calculations; the actual information from each record is not listed in the report.

ed in the report.

An additional consideration is that of mailing labels. Some programs let you print mailing labels on sheets that contain three or four labels across, and some let you use various fonts and styles in the output. No single program gives great variety in both placement and style of mailing-label output, though.

Other Features

Four minor features that may be important to advanced users are a List option, hidden fields, password protection, and file locking.

iewing one record at a time and clicking on the Next and Previous buttons to move around in the file can be tiresome. Listing records on the screen makes scanning and data entry easier. (Some programs allow you to list only by designing a report, which you can then view.)

Most programs let you print only chosen fields in a report, and in many programs, some fields do not show on the screen because the record design is larger than one screen size. A true hidden field, however, is one that you can prevent from showing on the screen, which keeps the screen from being unnecessarily cluttered and speeds up your data entry and record reading.

An important consideration for business databases is password protection—can you prevent data in certain fields from being altered, and even being seen, without proper au-

If for no other reason, the computer operator should guard against RFI simply because its effect can nullify the time saving benefits provided by the computer.

thorization? Sometimes different levels of protection are available for certain fields, records, or entire files.

Within a networking system, if more than one person at a time tries to access the database, a file can be ruined. A file-locking feature prevents such accidents by limiting access to one user at a time.

f you find it a little mind-boggling trying to consider all of the features and cross-comparisons, take a look at the report card (see figure 3). I have rated each of the 13 programs in general categories, focusing on the following qualities:

Power. How many fields and records can the program handle? Is it relational? Is it flexible enough to meet diverse needs?

Performance. How well does it do what it is supposed to do?

Ease of Learning. How long does it take to learn the basics of creating and handling a file—and how much effort does it require?

Ease of Use. Is it easy to enter data and scan records? Is it easy to get from one record to another? Are there keyboard options for menu selections? Are there ways to enter multiple commands without pulling down the menu repeatedly?

Integration Level. Can you go di-

rectly from designing a record form to entering data? Do you have to switch to a separate mode to add, edit, or delete records?

Reports. Can you print in draft/standard/high-quality modes? Can you use different fonts and styles? Can you easily print out different types of "pages"—mailing labels, index cards, lists, reports, envelopes?

Data Transfer. Are the files readable from any other application? Do they link with MacWrite or with another program by the same manufacturer? Can you save them as text files that another program or computer can read?

Mac Interface. How does everything look; how does it work? Are the mouse and menus well integrated into the program environment? Does the program utilize the Mac's graphics capabilities?

Documentation. Is it printed on good paper in a clear typeface, with a decent index and reference section? Is it written in English, technobabble, or Greek?

harts twice the size of the ones presented here couldn't tell you everything you need to know to make a final decision about a database purchase. You should check other issues of A+ for

in-depth reviews of many Macintosh databases; in the meantime, these additional comments may help:

DBMaster can handle phenomenally large fields that can span 44 disks. You can use fonts and styles on-screen, but not in printouts.


Filevision is a graphics-database program. You can store and retrieve information through pictures that have an underlying database of text information about the objects in a picture.

1st Base is a powerful, well-designed program that is seriously hampered by its draft-quality-only printing and lack of communication with other software packages.

Helix uses the Macintosh interface of icons and windows to the maximum, providing users with a powerful relational database that they can easily control by diagramatically manipulating complex arrangements of data.




Figure 4: Hayden's I Know It's Here Somewhere allows up to five files to be open at one time. Although it is not a powerful program, its ease of use and perfect performance make it just right for small, personal file needs.

I Know It's Here Somewhere is an absolutely perfect little program (see figure 4, next page). It is small, though, and so is suited for use in a home rather than in a business—even a small business.

Computer Software Design's Mac-Lion should probably get an "outstanding" rating for power, because a lot of power is buried in there somewhere. MacLion comes with a complete programming language to let you manipulate records to your heart's content, but you will hardly

know that you're working on a Mac.

Main Street Filer is mediocre at best and easily wins the "worst documentation" award.

MegaFiler is especially good for mailing labels, and it has the advantage of being compatible with other Mac applications from Megahaus. Microsoft File is an all-around winner. The program is made more attractive by the fact that Word has a "conditional language" that can print special forms based on File's records (see figure 2).

Omnis 2 doesn't offer much in the way of output quality or variety, and

it certainly doesn't look as if it were made for the Macintosh. It is upwardly compatible with the relational Omnis 3, however. Although it was not available for review, Omnis 3 should be available by the time this article is published, so I have included it in the charts.

OverVUE is an excellent program that needs improvement in its output options (see figure 1). An update, due out about the same time as this article, will offer a number of new features, including relational capabilities, keyboard macros (a way to chain often-used commands together), and charting and graphing abilities.

PFS:File is plain and not very powerful. It works easily and smoothly, but you might as well be working on another computer. (It is usually packaged with PFS:Report—the report features in the Additional Features chart (see page 111) refer to PFS:Report's abilities).







Monthly Calendar

Front Desk's central feature is a full-screen monthly calendar that displays the current month, as set on the Macintosh's internal calendar (see figure 1). The current day is highlighted, and check marks indicate past days. By clicking on the months at the right of the screen, you can move forward or backward through the year to locate a specific date.

Clicking to the left of any week on Front Desk's monthly calendar changes the display to a graphic representation of that particular week (see figure 2). Each appointment scheduled during the week appears as a shaded block. This design makes it easy to see at a glance when openings are available and when the work load is at its heaviest.

Because you can view the same schedule in a variety of ways, Front Desk makes it possible to do some tasks that would be very difficult with conventional scheduling systems. For example, a client needs an appointment but has only Wednesdays free. With Front Desk, you can easily bring the next few Wednesdays into view and locate an opening. You can view

a "month of Sundays," if need be!

One Day at a Time

Double-clicking on a particular day brings a schedule of that day into view, and you can see a day's worth of appointments in various ways. This schedule shows the activities slated for each member of the team, but does not allow for very detailed information.




Figure 3: MegaFiler stores information in forms.

Arranging the display so that it shows only one "resource"—as Front Desk calls staff members—gives a much more informative picture (see figure 3). Here, on each single line, are the name of each person with an appointment, the person's telephone number, the type of appointment, the fee, and the status of the appointment. Scroll bars at the right of the

screen move the listing to a later or earlier time in the day, and scroll bars at the bottom of the screen let you jump forward or backward one or more days at a time.

Appointment-Entry Form






Figure 4: "Printing" a mailing list to another disk

If you need more detailed information, double-clicking on a time block brings an appointment-entry form into view (see figure 4). The form shows a detailed breakdown of an appointment and includes starting and ending time, expected revenue, and even a section for comments and notes.

You use this same form to enter new appointments. Simply doubleclick on an empty time slot, and a blank form appears. Fill in the required information, and Front Desk automatically reserves the time and calculates expected revenue based on the services to be performed. Enter appointments that are longer than standard length by selecting several adjacent time slots at the same time.

Service menu holds a choice of professional services that your company offers. In a law firm, this menu could include Consultation, Closing, Will Preparation, Incorporation, and other legal services. If you were using the program in a dental office, you would list Cleaning, X ray, Filling, and Extrac-

up the older records and put them into your permanent archives.

Front Desk produces many useful reports. One of these, the Appointment Confirmation Report, lists all the appointments scheduled for a given day or week and whether the individual appointments need final confirmation.

Selecting Appointment Analysis from the Actions menu produces two other reports—the Work Hours Report and the Revenues Report. The former shows the type of appointments each member of your staff has scheduled for the month. The Work Hours Report also compares the work load of staff members (see figure 5).

The Revenues Report gives a breakdown of a company's revenue

sources, showing how much of your income is coming from each service. The same report shows how the income breaks down by staff member, and it also gives the average hourly income derived from each service (see figure 6).

Reports can reflect activity for a day or for a complete month, and for one or all of the staff members listed on a Work Hours Report or Revenues Report. Standard Macintosh printformatting commands are available in the Report mode, allowing you full control over the final output.







Integrated

Data integration is an important part of the Macintosh computer's design that lets it move information from one program into another with relative ease. Although moving graphics from MacPaint into MacWrite documents is fairly simple, some tasks are much more difficult. For example, taking names and addresses from a list and inserting them, one by one, into form letters is possible, but it would be a very tedious job.

Megahaus Corporation produces an integrated family of three programs for the Macintosh that help you use the machine's talents more efficiently. By bridging the gap between different program types, these packages also allow you to do some tasks that were impossible in the past.

egaMerge adds form-letter capabilities to standard MacWrite documents. To create a form letter, you use MacWrite to prepare the document itself. Every form letter has two parts: a section that is common to all of the letters you will send and the material that will change from letter to letter (such as name, address, and salutation). You distinguish the parts of the letter that are subject to change by using a different font style than that of the rest of the text. Figure 1 shows a typical form letter in which the 14-point Chicago font sets the name, address, city, | Figure 1: A typical MegaMerge form letter


state, ZIP, salutation, and product apart from the rest of the letter, which is in the standard 12-point Geneva


A second file holds the names, addresses, and other information for merging into the letter. This file contains the item names you'll use in the other document, along with the corresponding data for each one (see figure 2, next page). The font of the category names in the letter (called the merge font) matches that of the category names in the data file, so that the program can identify the data it merged into the letter.

You can produce the data file with MacWrite, but even entering two or

three names this way is time-consuming, since you must include category names with each entry. Mega-Merge can use lists you've generated with MegaFiler, making the task considerably easier.

With floppy-disk drives and an Imagewriter, MegaMerge's printing process is painfully slow—the system spends as much time reading data from the disk as putting it on paper. If you're thinking of using MegaMerge for a large mailing, you had best either set plenty of time aside for printing or consider investing in a harddisk drive and a LaserWriter, which will speed up the process significantly. With a single 31/2-inch floppydrive system, you'll also have more

than your share of disk swapping when you prepare the list and document files.

MegaMerge supports chain printing, the printing of several MacWrite documents sequentially as if they were one large piece. This option helps overcome the limit on document length in RAM-based versions of MacWrite (versions 1.0-2.2). To use this feature, you simply create a MacWrite document that lists the names of the documents you want printed, in the order you want them to appear. The process is similar to the one you use with form letters, except that MegaMerge substitutes complete files for each of the filenames you have listed. Another function allows you to merge MacPaint illustrations into MacWrite documents during the printing process or create form letters with the automatic insertion of graphics rather than text. MegaFiler

MegaFiler is a light-duty system for information storage and retrieval that is easy to use but just as easy to outgrow. Like MegaMerge, MegaFiler can work with a single-drive system, but an external drive makes program use much easier.

You store information in forms (records), in much the same way as you would do manually with index cards (see figure 3). A form can hold up to 60 separate pieces of information (fields) with a maximum total of 1500 characters. Each file allows up to 10,000 records, but the size of each record and the amount of available disk space can limit the file size.

The program uses dialog boxes and pull-down menus throughout. As with most Macintosh software, MegaFiler follows the Mac's conventions, and you can use it efficiently right from the start, with little need to consult the manual.

nce you've selected a data file, you can add new records, browse through those already in the file, or search for entries that match particular criteria. To recall records, you look for a match in any field, but the search is much faster if you presort the file by the appropriate field. For example, a file of customer data, presorted in order of purchase date, would help you locate



customer records by date, but it would hold you up if you were searching for a customer by name.

MegaFiler comes complete with several ready-to-use form designs, but creating your own forms is easy. You need only enter the field names you want to use, specify the type of information each field will contain (alphabetic, numeric, or date), and define an area on the form for the data to appear. The entire process is so simple that you can create a new file design in just a few minutes.

eports for analyzing the data in your files are also easy to design. Two styles are available for the finished list. The label format allows you to print mailing and shipping labels, and the table format organizes the report into rows and columns of data. In the table format, you can also have a summation or count appear at the bottom of the report for numeric analysis.

In both cases, you use the mouse to select which fields you wish to include and position them in the order you wish them to appear, which makes label and report design a snap.


I experimented with several of the sample files, as well as a few files of my own design. In one test, I "printed" a small mailing list to another disk so that MegaMerge could read it and merge the information into form letters (see figure 4). With one disk drive, the process required 18 disk swaps, although the file held only eight names and addresses. With a two-drive system, no swaps are necessary, however.

MegaForm

Megahaus' form-generating program, MegaForm, requires 512K RAM, and a second disk drive is optional but strongly recommended. This program—like the others—is difficult to use on a single-drive machine.

MegaForm is in a class by itself. It lets you create custom forms such as invoices, order forms, or expense sheets and fill them in manually or with data from MegaFiler records. These forms can be as simple or as complex as you need and even include graphics you've created with MacPaint as part of the form design.

with a set of graphic tools similar to those in MacPaint. They let you create and position boxes, lines, and titles. Once you've finished the design, you assign certain areas of the form for data entry. You can fill the entryor cells, as MegaForm calls themwith data directly from the keyboard or calculate its value based on information in another part of the form. Thus, you can design forms that automatically calculate figures such as tax, total or discount rate. The commands Megaform uses are similar to those of an electronic-spreadsheet program and are easy to learn.

cell can "look up" its value from a table located in another part of the form. The data it gets may be a simple value or a reference to yet another table of data. You can make tables or any cells invisible by placing them outside the main form in an area that does not reproduce when you print out the form. Another option provides a sequential "serial" number that you can use to

MegaForm, MegaFiler, and MegaMerge each offer unique features.

number automatically each form that you fill out.

MegaForm's ability to cross-reference information contained in cells to MegaFiler data files is the program's most powerful option. For example, an order form may contain a cell, marked "Part Number," with a part number you've entered from the keyboard.

MegaForm can use the number in that cell to locate a MegaFiler record corresponding to that particular item. This record, in turn, may contain information such as the description and price of the item, which can be referenced by another part of the form. One form can access several different data files for information, which, in effect, adds basic "relational" capability to MegaFiler.




Figure 5: A MegaForm invoice form

Once you've designed a form, you can fill in as many individual copies as you need. Completed forms are

stored in a permanent archive file, and you can recall them for examination later. After you put a form into the archive, however, you can't alter the form in any way.

egaForm's Print option produces hard copy of the form you're currently filling or of another form stored in the archive. Since the entire form-including graphics-prints out, the printing process is slow. Printing the invoice form in figure 5 on an Imagewriter in the standard printing mode took more than four minutes. In the highquality mode, printing takes even longer. This speed handicap makes MegaForm impractical for producing a large quantity of forms on an Imagewriter. If you anticipate needing many forms, you should definitely consider purchasing a LaserWriter, which will greatly improve this program's performance and output quality. To help speed things up even more, MegaForm allows you to print just the data portion of a form while

using preprinted forms—rather than blank paper—in your printer.

As interesting as MegaForm may be, it is not the most practical solution to most data-management problems. For example, it lacks a way to analyze or generate reports from the information stored in the archive. Once you've filled a form in, you can print it, but nothing more. Hopefully, Megahaus will address this limitation in a future version.



ince summer officially starts this month, perhaps it's time to spend a column doing some late-spring housecleaning.

This month, in no particular order, we'll look at fattening your own Mac, FastFinder (version 1.6) from Tardis Software, and a programming-tool-in-progress: MacNosy (version 1.0). I also have a few comments on previous columns and products I've dealt with. That should clear my shelves of the miscellaneous things I've been wanting to tell you about, so next month we'll jump back into our look at some Mac programming languages.

Fattening Your Own Mac

Well, they said you could do it, and I did—I fattened my own Mac. The original impetus for chopping up my pristine Macintosh motherboard was an article that appeared in the January issue of *Dr. Dobb's Journal* (2464 Embarcadero Way, Palo Alto, CA 94303; back issues cost \$3.50 each, which includes shipping). Next came a short article in 68 Micro Journal that gave an abbreviated version of the Mac-fattening routine.

Then, at the first MacWorld exposition in late February in San Francisco, about half a dozen firms offered various "parts kits" and their own instructions at mouthwatering prices (as low as \$225–\$350 if you wanted them to do the work). Since I'd enlisted in the microcomputer revolution with a soldering iron in hand (there wasn't any other way), I decided that I had nothing to fear, assuming I still remembered how to solder.

First the warnings: Fattening your own Macintosh will void your warranty, may ruin your motherboard forever (if you slip), will take a good deal of time spent hunched over teeny holes trying to get the solder out of them, and generally is not most folks' idea of fun.

Getting the Mac apart is relatively easy (I bought a set of one-inch-long hex wrenches from Jensen Tools, which work well enough to open the case, but the "proper" tool to get the case open is a Torx screwdriver such

as the Xcelite XTD-10). Cutting all 16 RAM chips off the motherboard gave me a bit of a shudder, since at that point, I was committed to making the change. Once you've cut the chips off, you need to desolder (and remove the solder from) 256 locations. It's at this step that I can offer Mac fatteners a few words of advice.

The Macintosh motherboard is a four-layer printed circuit board, which means that some of the traces (connections) run across the two outside surfaces and others run across two surfaces inside the board. Pulling the solder from the holes that are connected only on the outside is simple-my 27-watt iron did a nice job, and an iron of that size is small enough so that you don't run much risk of damaging the board. Unfortunately, two of the connections for each memory chip attach to the middle layers of the board, and the way Apple laid out the board makes the middle layer act as a heat sink, diverting the heat from the iron onto the traces-exactly what you don't want to happen!

So, if you're going through all the trouble of doing the four hours' work it takes to fatten a Mac, take some advice: desolder every connection for each memory chip, except those for pins 8 and 16, with a low-wattage iron, such as the 27-watt one I used.

Don't even bother with pins 8 and 16 yet. Once you've cleared out all the other holes, switch soldering irons. I found that a 35-watt iron was the smallest that allowed me to get the solder out of pins 8 and 16. Be more careful with these pins than you were with the others—this step is tricky, and is the one point at which you are most likely to damage the mother-board.

nce you overcome this hurdle, things are easy again. Switch back to the low-wattage iron, solder in 16 sockets where the memory ICs used to be, solder in the extra required ICs and resistors, then stuff the sockets with 256K × 1 RAM chips. Voilà, you have 512K!

The low price for 256K RAM chips on March 1 was about \$8 apiece. Thus, with a little shopping around and some intense work, you can fatten a Mac for less than \$150.

Assuming that you do a good job, the only problem will be figuring out what to do if your machine needs repairs or you try to update to a Hyperdrive hard-disk drive. To install a Hyperdrive, the manufacturer, General Computer, desolders the 68000

chip and installs a small disk-controller board. The Hyperdrive folks warranty the resultant Mac, but I'm not sure if they will if you've already taken a soldering iron to the board.

So far, I think that fattening my own Mac was worth it, but I'll let you know if I run into any problems.

ike Lehman got frustrated with the pokiness of the Macintosh Finder when he was using system-development software, so he decided to do something about it. The result was FastFinder.

Mike is no newcomer to development. Before he formed Tardis Software (2817 Sloat Road, Pebble Beach, CA 93953) to distribute FastFinder, he was director of language development at Digital Research, and he's also the author of Digital Research's Pascal MT+.

To make a long story short, Fast-Finder drops the Mac's iconic (graphic) approach to displays and substitutes a more traditional, command-oriented interface. When you start up from a disk with FastFinder installed, you get an Enter command: message in an otherwise blank window in the middle of the screen.

One of the things that slows the Macintosh down seems to be the time it takes to calculate such things as the position of the various graphic elements and then show them. The manual claims that FastFinder runs as

much as five times faster than Apple's Finder, although when I tried it with the Macintosh 3½-inch drives, FastFinder cut the time only in half.

Where FastFinder really excels is on a hard-disk drive, such as the Corvus. First, you can have up to 12 volumes (disks) on line at once, more than most hard-disk drives allow. Second, and more important, is that FastFinder has no limit on the number of files that can appear in one volume. The Apple Finder (version 1.1), on the other hand, bogged down on me at a grand total of 117 files (including folders). And, yes, you can put FastFinder on a hard disk so that you can start FastFinder up from the hard disk, although I'm not sure if you can do so with all hard disks. We've tested FastFinder with the Lisa (Mac XL), Corvus, Davong, and Hyperdrive hard-disk drives, and it does work with all of them.




Figure 1: You can pull down one of the menus at the top of the display and use it to start the command.

If you don't have icons to look at, just how do you select files, erase them, move them around, and otherwise use the system? You have a choice: You can type commands, such as ERASE MY FILENAME, or you can pull down one of the menus at the top of the display and use it to start the command (see figure 1).

he FastFinder commands actually allow you to do a bit more than you can do with the usual Apple Finder—if you're familiar with



Why would you want to give up Apple's beautiful pictures for a touchtyping session? If the speed increase in invoking or moving between applications isn't enough, think of the other things FastFinder allows you to do. You can prepare a "script" of commands you want executed in order. I put together a short script that starts up the C compiler, compiles my files, links them, installs the resources, and then prints out listings of all of them with the time and date. Compiling no longer means a lot of pointing and clicking. Yes, you can do some of the same things with the transfer routines in the development-system editor, but not with the same degree of sophistication.


ikewise, the information FastFinder presents in a verbose directory of files (see figure 2) is more enlightening than Apple's. Note that the directory shows the size of the data and resource forks of every file, identifies the file icons and the file types, and gives the application IDs in addition to the usual name, date, and size. During development of new programs, I find this information handy, although in the everyday course of events, I can easily live without this overkill.

FastFinder is not without its faults. I wish that you could set the time and date from the command line, instead of just displaying it. If you pull down



You can alter the size of the window in which the commands appear, but the "grow" box in the corner doesn't appear until you click and drag on it. The manual could use a bit of work to make it more suitable for novices, and the hard-disk connection could be better described.

Il in all, however, FastFinder does pretty much what it claims to and will speed us developers on our way. By the way, FastFinder was written in Consulair C, the product I wrote about last month. **Miscellany**

If you haven't been keeping up with the *constant* changes going on with the Apple Supplemental Software, you should note that some new utilities and some updates of ones that already exist are floating around.

First, the font editor is in version 2.02. No major changes here, but it's a step in eradicating a few bugs. Second, RMover (or Resource Mover on some disks) has pretty much been superceded by REdit (Resource Edit). This program finally allows you to do most resource maintenance work in a single batch, with one tool. I'm not sure if Apple is directly distributing these files or not, since I'm not about to pay another \$100 just to see what files the company's shipping for the Supplemental Software offering these days. Your best bet in looking for these files is a local Macintosh users' group. I found the aforementioned files plus a font doubler, RAM test, and binary-to-hex converter on disk 5 of the Stanford Macintosh User Group library. At the MacWorld exposition, I noticed that most of the users' groups that exhibited there all had roughly the same files available, albeit on different disks. Check with your local users' group—it's worth the few bucks it takes to join.

While I'm on the subject of things to join, you should take a close look at *MacTutor*, a newsletter for Macintosh programmers (formerly *MacTech*, before a trademark difficulty got in the way; actually, the new name may also bring up trademark questions—I've seen at least two other organizations claiming ownership of the name

MacTutor). The first issue didn't do much for me, but the subsequent ones have been first class. Columns on C, BASIC, Pascal, Forth, and assembly language all grace the pages of MacTutor. You'll find this newsletter an invaluable source of technical information. Subscriptions are \$24 a year (12 issues); MacTutor, P.O. 846, Placentia, CA 92670; (714) 993-9939).

Meanwhile, some of the products I've mentioned in previous columns have been updated. The Softworks C compiler, for instance, has undergone a recent revision. I can't really keep track of all the revisions of software and let you know in a timely fashion when they change, so, starting with this column, if there's a version number for the product I'm looking at, I'll give it in the text. That way you can ask the developer what's new since the version I reviewed.

MacNosy

Hmmm... What to say about this product? Well, it certainly isn't for everyone out there in readerland, yet this surprisingly powerful tool can certainly do things other disassemblers I've seen for the Mac can't.

To start with, you'll need a 512K Mac or a Mac XL (Lisa) with at least that much memory running Mac-Works. Call up MacNosy, tell it what


program (or ROM) to work on, and you'll be greeted with some cryptic (but decipherable) messages.

MacNosy is what I'd have to call a "threaded disassembler," for lack of a better term. MacNosy looks at the code of the program you instruct it to inspect, figuring out how many procedures and instructions it has and where the various procedures call one another; then it substitutes names for as many of the routines and data structures as it can.

rom there, you're on your own. What you can do with MacNosy is limited only by your curiosity and intelligence. The documentation, although limited, does a decent job of getting you started. The version I've been using doesn't have all of the eventual features working, but it does have enough to do a decent disassembly of the ROM or any program you might happen to have lying around.

The author of MacNosy, Steve Jasik, seems to have the best understanding of the Macintosh's internal workings of any non-Apple-taught person I've met. I can barely follow

him when he sits down with Mac-Nosy and shows me around sections of the ROM and describes what they

I also can't begin to explain all of MacNosy's functions. The command lines are dense and full of abbreviations that will take you a few days to figure out. Note how MacNosy has substituted labels for data wherever it can. Some of these labels can be misleading, but more often than not, MacNosy is right in deciphering meanings.

Jasik promised me a newer, improved version of MacNosy when I met him at the MacWorld exposition, so I'll cut this report short and bring you up to date in a future column. Another Debugger

Yet another debugger has made it to market. This one is called TMON, from TMQ Software (1110 Lake Cook Road, Buffalo Grove, IL 60090).

TMON appears to be the debugger that Apple should have given us, but didn't. At present, it is the only one that allows you to see your program's full screen image while debugging on a 128K Macintosh. True, you can debug only smallish programs (perhaps as big as 8K) this way, but that's better than Apple was able to do with its debugger.

More important, TMON has several useful extensions that other Mac debuggers don't. One of the best examples is the File command, which opens up a window that shows you all the resources associated with a given file and where those resources are at any given moment. ("Nowhere" means it is still on the disk and hasn't been moved into memory yet; "on disk" would have been a better name, but most people who write debuggers aren't particularly concerned about clarifying what onscreen terminology means.)

All ROM Toolkit traps are displayed by name, an especially helpful feature when you're using TMON to look at the assembly code for a given memory region. As with most debuggers, you may examine and modify all of the 68000's registers at any time, look at the status of the flags, dump sections of memory in hex, singlestep a program, and set breakpoints (up to seven in TMON). These basic abilities allow you to examine a program one instruction at a time and learn exactly what it is doing and when. TMON also lets you change parameters to some instructions to test other values for the routines you're examining.

igure 3 shows three printouts of on-screen windows I got while using TMON in a recent session. (Figure 4 shows the screen itself-TMON, like most low-level debugging tools, intercepts the Finder's Save screen command, holding onto it until you leave the monitor section of the program, at which time ingenious solution to a problem with many of the Macintosh debugging tools that I have seen.) Note the clear format in each of the windows—even people who do not know assembly language should be able to figure out what each item is.



TMON's weakness, if it has one, is its manual. The title page does say, "This is a technical manual . . . It is not intended in any way to be a tutorial." That's an understatement, at best. It took me much longer than it should have to figure out how to grab a program and examine it under TMON. Giving commands to the program itself is reasonably simple but enough unlike the usual Macintosh methodology to slow down the occasional debugger. For example, the top line looks like a menu bar but is actually a series of buttons. You can move windows by putting the mouse anywhere in them and dragging up or down (no left or right movement is allowed, since each window takes up the full width of the display). The scroll bars on the right look like Macintosh scroll bars, but they also don't quite work like the normal ones do. All in all, these differences are not important, but they will slow some of you down while you're first exploring the program.

This program offers a lot more than what I can fit into this potpourri column, but TMON leaves a few things to be desired: a manual with more tutorial material, quicker ways to move around in memory sections than using the scroll bar or faking the program out with short assembly routines, and perhaps a less convoluted method of getting programs set up for disassembly. Nevertheless, it is the handiest debugger I've seen for Macintosh assembly-language programmers and worth the effort to learn.

Not Caught Up, But Close Enough

There's still a pile of Macintosh programming information sitting on my desk, but I did put a dent into it this time around.

This Forth is probably the best language on the Macintosh at present, so we'll take a close look at it next time. 

MacTips Suggestions from our readers

DIFFERENT FONTS FOR DIFFERENT FOOTERS

When you work with the Header option and Footer option in MacWrite, you can use multiple fonts and font sizes. For example, you can design a letterhead with the first line in 14-point bold and the remaining lines in a smaller point size. The automatic page numbering and dating are formatted in the font, style, and point size of the first character in the header. Thus, if you type the word *Page* to precede the automatic page number, the font and style of the two will not be identical.

To solve this problem, simply type a space (one press of the space bar) as the first character in the header. Set the font, size, and style of this space to correspond with the style you desire for the auto date and page numbering. After you've set this first space, the remaining characters can have as many font and style changes as you desire, but the page numbers, time, and dates will always be in the style you set for the first character.

MOUSE WASH

After your mouse has scurried across your desktop for several weeks, you may discover that the cursor does not seem responsive. You try to pick up an icon quickly and dump it into the trash can, and the pointer sticks, and stumbles on itself. Chances are your Macintosh is not overheating, nor is the connection from the mouse to the Mac going bad. Your mouse simply needs some tender loving care.

Turn the mouse over, and you will see a rubber ball that allows you to roll the mouse over a surface easily. Further inside the mouse are three cylinders in contact with the rubber ball. As you roll the mouse across a surface, the rubber ball picks up dust and other debris that presses against

the three internal cylinders. After the cylinders build up enough lint and debris, the rubber ball no longer rotates smoothly, which causes the cursor or pointer to stick and stumble. To keep your mouse sliding smoothly, you only need to open the mouse and clean the cylinders.




Figure 1 (top): Hold the mouse upside down to remove the rubber ball.

Holding the mouse upside down, remove the rubber ball by turning the black retaining ring counterclockwise until it stops (see figure 1). The marker on the washer should have rotated from the L (lock) to the O (open) position. Turn the mouse right side up again, letting the rubber ball and black retaining ring fall into your hand.

Next, after removing the two Phillips-head retaining screws, gently pull open the case from the cord end while pushing the base of the cord out of its resting place (see figure 2). Now you should be able to see the three cylinders inside the mouse clearly. Attached along the shaft of the two black cylinders are optical wheels that measure the movement of the rubber ball. The third silver cylinder just supports the rubber ball. Do not try to remove the black cylinders for cleaning; the posts holding these cylinder assemblies in are rigid and break easily (see figure 3). Clean all three cylinders with a cotton swab and denatured alcohol. Gently swab each cylinder, rubbing from front to back, removing the residue buildup until the surface is smooth. Remove any lint from the shafts of the black cylinders and clean the rubber ball with a soft, clean, dry cloth.

To reassemble the mouse, make sure the mouse button and spring are correctly seated in the housing, reinsert the base of the cord into the housing, and replace the two retaining screws. Finally, put the rubber ball inside the mouse and lock it into place with the black retaining ring.

PLOTTING ERROR BARS

Microsoft's Chart is a powerful tool for creating and printing graphs, but it is intended primarily for business uses. It thus lacks several features that are necessary for scientific applications. In particular, Chart does not provide a means for plotting data points with error bars.




Figure 4: Format for MacWrite data file to put on the clipboard. Select and transfer only data below the line. Note that the number of rows must equal or exceed the number of columns. Tabs separate columns, and a carriage return ends each row.

Fortunately, you can remedy this deficiency by creating a data table with a spreadsheet or with MacWrite. In the example in figure 4, I constructed a line graph by creating a data table with MacWrite. In the left column are the x values with which the average y values (second column) are associated. The average y value plus the standard deviation are in the third column, and the average y values minus the standard deviation are in the fourth column. Each of these y values is associated with the x value in the first column.

If you create a data table like this one, transfer the data to the clip-board, then run Chart, and follow the directions below, Chart will produce a line graph like the one in figure 5.

To enter data from the clipboard into Chart, go through these steps:

- 1. Run Chart
- 2. Data Menu: select Number Specify filename
- 3. Edit Menu: Paste
- 4. Data Menu: List, select Plots
- 5. Click on Graph
- 6. Chart: Main = Line

7. Format: Main Hi-Lo ON

ANIMATION IN MACPAINT

It is possible to create a form of animation with MacPaint. The first step is to draw a rectangle about one half the size of the screen, filled with narrow horizontal or vertical lines.




Figure 6: Select the lasso and draw a shape such as this bird.

Next, select the lasso and draw a shape such as the bird in figure 6. Lasso the shape, press the Option key, and move the shape to the right of the rectangle. This procedure gives you a contrasting shape (the Option key leaves the shaded area filled in).




Figure 7: Lasso the second shape and place it on top of the first one.




Figure 8: Select Paste and move the shape across the screen.

Lasso the second shape and place it on top of the first one, so that the central part overlaps and creates a black area (see figure 7). Next, lasso the doubled figure and copy the shape, using Copy from the Edit menu. Fill the *entire screen* with narrow horizontal or vertical lines. Finally, select Paste from the Edit menu and move the bird shape across the screen (see figure 8). The wings of the doubled bird will flap as you move it.

RESTORING CLIPBOARD CONTENTS

You have something important on the clipboard, and you choose Cut to delete a segment of your MacWrite or Word text. The original contents of the clipboard are lost forever, right? Wrong. If you choose Undo, not only will the cut contents be returned to the document, but the clipboard will be restored to its prior state, with the important text back on it again.

WORD DELETE IN MACWRITE

If you double-click on a word in MacWrite, the characters of the word will be highlighted, but neither the leading nor the trailing space will be selected. If you want to delete a selected word, pressing Backspace will erase only the characters, and you have to press Backspace again to get rid of the extra space. But if you choose Cut when you select a word, both the word and one of the spaces will be erased.


Figure 9: An easy reference guide to FatBits shortcuts.




Figure 10: Using the paint bucket in FatBits allows you to fill in small areas with greater precision.

PAINT BUCKET IN FATBITS

If you want to fill in small areas with the paint bucket in MacPaint, it is often difficult to put the spout of the bucket in exactly the right place, and you sometimes end up with pattern spilling into areas where you don't want it. You can use the paint bucket in FatBits, though. The area is magnified, but the bucket remains the same size, so you can place it exactly where you need it (see figure 10). All of the other tools can also be used in FatBits. It is particularly interesting to see the spray can producing its pattern in a magnified form.

▶ APPLEWRITER 2.0 **PRINTING PROBLEM**

Q. I recently exchanged my Apple-Writer II for the ProDOS-based AppleWriter 2.0 and I am having trouble printing. With the older version, my files printed fine. The new version, however, prints a lot of extra spaces, as if it did not honor the margin settings. I have a Gemini 10X printer and a Grafstar interface card on my Apple Ile. Any suggestions?

A. Several readers have written us about similar problems with Epson printers and Grappler interface cards. Apparently the Apple Writer printer drivers were rewritten for release 2.0 and contained a few glitches. Not all printer/interface-card combinations experience this problem, but if yours does, your authorized Apple dealer should have a printer-configuration disk that will fix the bugs. Dealers that don't have this disk can get it from Apple technical support.

Incidentally, similar problems have crept into AppleWorks. If you are having problems printing and/or the printer prints strange characters at the top of pages, you should check with your dealer for a similar remedy.

Q. I am tired of Chicago as the system font on my Macintosh. I have Apple's Through the Looking Glass, and I like the font used for system messages with that disk. How can I change the system

A. Macintosh fonts have assigned numbers; the system font is always font 0. Normally, Chicago occupies that slot.

You can change it easily, however, if you have one of Apple's resource utilities. These utilities, RMover and work on a backup disk until you are



Resource Editor, were made available to developers and to those who purchased the software supplement to Inside Macintosh. The utilities are widely available to users through local users' groups.

First, use Apple's Font Mover utility to be sure the system file on your boot disk contains the font you want to use.

To change the system font, you must assign the current system font to an unused number and assign the desired font the number 0. This action takes the name of the font. The actual font, however, is stored in font resource 12, so you must also reassign font resource 12 to another number and your desired font must get resource number 12. You assign font-resource numbers with the following formula: font number × 128 + point size. Thus, font number 1 in 12 point is stored in font resource 140 $(1 \times 128 + 12)$. Font names are always stored with a point size of 0.

For your own sanity, you should

sure you have successfully altered the system font. Then transfer your new system onto your application disk. For more information, keep your eyes on A+. We'll be covering Macintosh fonts in a future issue.

APPLE IIIe?

Q. I have an Apple III and am frustrated by the limitations of the Apple II Emulation mode. Does a way exist to get a full 64K Apple II into my Apple III?

PRINTING UNDER ProDOS

O. I'm having trouble when I use my printer from within a BASIC program running under ProDOS. Sometimes I get garbage on the screen, sometimes I seem to lose DOS, sometimes garbage appears on my listings. What's wrong? A. You could be doing one of several things wrong. Older Apple programs (before Apple's own 80-column card) use PR#0 to return printing to the screen after use of the printer. If you started printing from the 80-Column Active mode, you must turn off the printer with PR#3, not PR#0. This procedure may solve your problem.

Further, within programs you should issue PR# as a DOS command. Although PR# is an Applesoft command, the way that Apple DOS works demands that you use the command as a DOS command in a program. Do this by preceding the PR# with PRINT CHR\$(4) as in

100 PRINT CHR\$ (4) "PR #1"

Both of these comments also apply to DOS 3.3.

DELETING MAC FILES

Q. When using MacPaint, I have run out of space on my storage disk and have not had a blank disk to insert. Is there any way I can delete a file while inside an application so that I can save my current image?

A. Macintosh applications could provide this function, but most do not. If you have unwanted files, use the Save As command to save them to a file that you no longer want. The Mac will respond with a dialog box asking you whether you want to replace the disk file. Clicking on the Yes box will effectively delete the old file and replace it with the new. If you are a member of a Mac users' group, your group library probably has a set of desk accessories that can provide this function, as well as many other useful file-oriented functions. You need only install the desk accessory with the Desk Accessory Mover, also available from your users' group. Because you can use desk accessories within any Mac application, we highly recommend this approach.



PRINT SHOP DIRECTION

Q. I have an Apple IIe, Epson FX-80 printer, and Quadram APIC interface card. When I use Brøderbund's Print Shop, the Epson prints in one direction only. Can I make the Epson print bidirectionally to speed up printing?

A. No, and you really don't want it to. Brøderbund intentionally set the graphics-dump portion of its program to print unidirectionally in order to obtain better graphics registration. Graphics printed bidirectionally show slippage between the passes of the printhead. This slippage is minimized when the printhead returns to the left margin before printing a new line.

BETTER-QUALITY PRINT

Q. Can you advise me on a program to improve the print quality of my Epson RX-80? I own an Apple IIc.

A. Your hardware severely limits your choices. The Epson FX and JX series of printers (as well as other printers such as the Apple Imagewriter) feature downloadable character sets that allow you to substitute a more attractive font in place of the standard Epson character set. In the Enhanced mode, some of these fonts look excellent.

If you had an Apple IIe, you could add a new interface card such as the one from Spies Laboratories. This card takes the ASCII characters being sent to it for printing and converts them to graphics dots (from ROM on the card) before sending it to the printer. Because the printer is in the Graphics mode, printing is slower but prettier.

On the software side, SoftCraft's Fancy Font can coax even your RX-80 into producing high-quality output by translating your text into graphics, much as the Spies interface does. The program works only with CP/M. (A CP/M card for the IIc is available from Applied Engineering, Carrollton, TX 75006, (214) 492-2027.)

If your application really requires high-quality output, we'd recommend purchasing an inexpensive letter-quality printer. Most letter-quality printers under \$500 are very slow (fewer than 20 characters per second) but produce excellent output. Another option would be to sell your RX-80 and buy a printer with downloadable character sets, or, even better, one of the new high-density dot-matrix printers such as the Epson LQ-1500 or Toshiba 1340.
